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## Preface

This report provides supplementary information to the main National Report (Volume 2) and provincial reports of the 2009 Population and Housing Census of Solomon Islands. The data presented is referenced to the midnight of $22^{\text {nd }}$ of November 2009, the census date. It is anticipated that information contained in this report will assit in decision making, policy and planning and public debate with respect to the current and future socio-economic conditions in the country. Information herein is also relevant in the monitoring and evaluation of the National Development Strategy (NDS) 2011-2020 and the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) including other sectoral policies.
The report is presented in three parts. Part 1 provides the administrative information of the Census. Part 2 presents the statistical tables (person tables, household tables and population projection tables) corresponding to the information provided in the National Report, and Part 3 contains the appendices. The set of tables presented here adheres to United Nations Principles and Recommendations for Population and Housing Censuses to ensure that the standard of comparability with the previous censuses is maintained. Though there may have been slight changes to the numbering and ordering of the tables in each group, as well as situations where the titles may have been changed due to the structure and the format of the tables processed, it is important to note that table numbering starts with a ' P ' for Person tables and ' H ' for Household tables.

## Part 1: $\quad$ Census Operation and Procedures

### 1.1.1 Introduction

Census is an internationally recognized method for collecting demographic and key social and economic information for every island, community, man, woman and child. By definition a census is "A canvass of a given area, resulting in an enumeration of the entire population and the compilation of demographic, social and economic information pertaining to that population at a specific time" ${ }^{\prime \prime}$.

Censuses in the Solomon Islands date back to Colonial times, not until 1976 when an official one was conducted. Since then, census undertaking had been an activity enshrined in the Census Act (cap 53) that mandates the Solomon Islands National Statistics Office (SINSO) to carry out this exercise. Population census in the country is to be conducted every ten years. This is legislated in the Census Act, in accordance with United Nations recommendations for an inter-census period.
The first census in the Solomon Islands was conducted in 1931. However, it was a little more than an incomplete head count. The second one was conducted in 1959, but it was a sample census, and the third census in the country was conducted in 1970. Although the 1970 census was limited in scope, it was a seen as a proper census. However, the census rounds following in 1976, 1986, 1999 and 2009 were absolute censuses.

Reference to the United Nations recommendation of inter-censual period of ten years, the latest population and housing census in Solomon Islands was conducted in November 2009. By reasons of comparison, the 2009 census was conducted on a two round enumeration, and the effected official reference period best known as the 'census night' was the midnight of $22^{\text {nd }}$ November 2009.

Notably a census provides a unique source of detailed demographic, social and economic data relating to the entire population at a single point in time. Since there is no effective vital registration system operative in the country, and very few reliable and complete population statistics available from other sources, the census is a vital instrument in a wide range of activities in this regard. It also provides information on issues of housing and the extent to which the houses meet basic standards and key health indicators such as access to clean water and disposal of wastes. It is an important source of information for the Solomon Islands Government (SIG) as well as NGO, individuals, donors, and international agencies.
The data from the census supports national strategies and plans, policy development and decision making by the central and provincial governments, by private organizations, the interest groups, and for statistical purposes such as the establishment of sampling frame for surveys, the definition of provinces, wards and electoral boundaries ${ }^{2}$. Moreover the census information is useful for policy setting and implementation, research, planning and other decision-making; for example, the allocation of public funding in areas such as health, education and social policy. In general it is important to note that the main users of census information such as the government, local authorities, businesses, community organizations and the public will depend on the 2009 Population and Housing Census as benchmark information for the next ten years.

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### 2.1 Census history

Censuses in the Solomon Islands date back to colonial times. The first census was conducted in 1931, although it was a little more than an incomplete head count of the population. The second census was conducted in 1959 even though it was a sample census. The third census was conducted in 1970 and despite the fact of it being limited in scope, it was a proper census. However, the ones following in 1976, 1986, 1999 and 2009 were complete censuses.

With respect to the legislative basis of the census in the country the current situation had both the Census Act (cap 53) and the Statistics Act, 1970. The regulatory provisions are discretely prescribed by the Statistics Act, where one of the important provisions is the authorization of the SINSO as the only office to produce official statistics in the country under the leadership of the Government Statistician. In addition, the CA mandates the SINSO to carry out this exercise. In the nut-shell, the legislative provisions of the Statistical Act 1970 and the Census Act (cap 53) mandated the Government Statistician (GS) through SINSO to carry out the census exercise.

The regulation also authorizes the GS to be responsible for the administration and the completion of the census project. However, under the preserved administrative regulations and provisions, the Census Act allows for the appointment of a Census Commissioner (CC) to administer the census project. The GS therefore has the authority to recommend the CC to take full responsibility and management of the census project. According to the prescribed protocols the recommendation would be submitted to the Prime Minister by the Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Finance and Treasury (MoFT). The PM shall endorse the recommendation and gazette the endorsement and also made the public announcement of the CC's appointment. In addition, the provision of the regulations and the protocols enabled the SINSO to carry out the necessary activities required to plan, manage and implement all the necessary census activities.

Universally the history of census date back to bible time when Moses the leader of the children of Israel was commanded to conduct the census of population in the wilderness, recorded in the book of Numbers. Moreover the famous census in the Jews calendar was conducted when Jesus Christ was born in Bethlehem. The transition of European civilization revealed official population census was first conducted in England and Scotland in March 1801, Ireland in 1811 and Australia in 1828. The first New Zealand census was undertaken in 1851.

### 3.1 Census planning and management

The planning for the 2009 Census started with the strategic mission by Martin Butterfield in April 2008. Besides establishing the Census Office, Martin Butterfield discussed with SINSO on the development of 2009 Census overall strategies. This included the review of linkages between census and other projects, the review of the application of national standards, the review of national topic classifications, the review of national geographical classifications, the review application of international standards, the review of existing legislative framework for the census, identify areas of change that are expected in the procedures involved and to obtain policy approval for required legislative change. Intensive census dialogue continued with Mr . Butterfield on the development of census project plan and the detail census plan, the organizational structure ${ }^{3}$, and monitoring of activities.

Prior planning was undertaken to establish important relationships with users through establishment of a common user consultation forum, organizing subsequent meetings for the forums, and the dialogue on agency views and topics made easy reference to the questionnaire design. Notable publicity criteria and review of calendar of events that will support respondents with memory lapse for information consistency. Inclusive dialogue on the evaluation plans, the

[^1]pilot test and the overall pilot census evaluation report. Financial management involved developing a realistic budget, the process of channeling the budget for approval, budget training, and budget review and also developing a budget management system and budget review were discussed.

From the planning and management perspective, the Census had two main objectives. Firstly, it was to ensure that the process of collecting, compiling, evaluating, analyzing and disseminating of demographic, economic and social data was conducted in a timely and accurate manner. The development of procedures and processes for the 2009 Population and Housing Census was anticipated to make use of the lessons learned in previous censuses, and built upon recommendations for improvements. Secondly, it was a valuable opportunity for the capacity development of staff of the SINSO, thus resulting in enhancing the image, credibility and reputation of the office and at the same time, strengthening its infrastructure. In this regard all census key positions were awarded to SINSO staffs and in addition two departmental units namely the Social and Censuses \& Surveys units were engaged on full time basis during peak period of the census field operation. The only exception was the Census Technical Advisor position that was filled by an expatriate and other few supporting staffs contracted to work for the project.

The challenge melted through vision, planning and coordination, delegation of responsibility and a strong team spirit, and in anticipation the census work planned to be conducted in an effective and efficient manner. Staff at all levels were encouraged to have an open mindset in addressing issues. Participation from other parties both within and outside the government were encouraged together with the establishment of avenue to channel respective participation through the Census Users Committee. As a result, a wider community including the National and Provincial Government, Non-Governmental Organisation, Secretariat of the Pacific Community (SPC), donor partners like AusAID, ROC, EU, UNDP, UNFPA, and the general public supported the 2009 Census project. In fact the full support from UNFPA, AusAID and SPC was based on collaborative understanding that quality control at different stages of the census process was ensured.

Data consistency between censuses was an important consideration in the overall census planning. Demands for and the use of data, improvement in data accessibility and analytical tools were also considered. The use of GIS as a means of disseminating the census information resulted as one of the major appreciation for the 2009 Census.

Detail planning in areas such as enumeration procedures and field operation, public communication, mapping and re-designing of census EA boundaries, data processing, reporting, content determination, dissemination procedures, and questionnaire development and training. These aspects, and how they interacted with each other, played a crucial role in determining the quality of the census outputs. Each phase therefore required careful, systematic planning and control.

Prior to the Census proper important preparations were made. This included a household listing exercise, a pilot census, the production of maps, the design and printing of questionnaire, manuals, registration books, the purchase of office equipments, the recruitment of staff; the establishment of short term training centres; the preparation of training manuals and aids. The planning and execution of transport schedules to gather supervisors and enumerators in the training centres, transport to assist movement to and from their allotted EA's; the publicity needed to make the whole population aware of the census, the questions and the information they are to supply. All these tasks were done in a particular sequence and ecpected to be completed strictly at important schedule dates. The census effort therefore required utmost co-operation from all parties involved, authorities at various levels, private organisations and the village and urban populations. To foster the support needed for
this purpose the CC reports to the CUC, and in particular the GS at various critical stages of the project and seek concurrence for census planned activities.
The exact date of the census night was decided by the CC in consultation with Government departments and other bodies particularly with the Ministry of Education. Agreement of the CUC should also have been sought as the Census date was related to methods of enumeration. The census date, commonly known as the 'census night' was on midnight the $22^{\text {nd }}$ of November 2009 officially announced by the PM at the official launch of the 2009 National Population and Housing Census project in September 2008.

The 2009 census enumeration field work planning underwent a last minute change in September 2009, when SINSO proposed a two-tiered census enumeration method, the rational being that visiting all households twice instead of once was believed to improve the data quality and had proven its merits in the Solomon Islands 1999 census. The first visit took place two weeks prior to the official census date, to be followed by a second visit shortly after the census date. All enumerator is required to visit all households (on average 60 households) in their allocated EA. The enumerator is to return to the households after census date, on which occasion any change in the household such as visitors, or births, and deaths are recorded. The two-tiered approach is implemented in the majority of EAs, but there were areas encountered difficult to fully implement the two-tiered visits and these includes some areas of Honiara and Guadalcanal.

### 3.2 Management

The management of the census project was the greatest challenge of the day to day census activity operations. Poor management practice reduces the credibility of the planning phase as there was no strong administrative and management control to ensure strong implementation of the census. As a result, associated outcomes such as absenteeism and lateness to work by many senior and junior officers in the census office were realised. At the same time the management challenges were visible in the recruitment and selection processes by census office, mostly in Honiara and in some provinces. The absence of Census Office meetings especially to follow up work progress in the respective key work areas disputed the coordination of the census work progress. Though however a handful of committed census officers shouldered most of the activities, these activities could have been efficiently accomplished if all staff worked together.
Similarly the overall management of funds in line with the census activity work plan faced challenges. Prior to the census proper, household listing and a pilot census were organized. The unbudgeted extension of the household listing exercise which was supposed to be covered for two months went on for seven months. Moreover, the post enumeration mopping exercise involved an unjustifiable substantial number of census enumerators including area managers, trainers, master trainers and the census district superintendents. This exercise was seriously unbudgeted for and showed the lack of appreciation of the need to adhere to project work plans, financial rules and regulations during the project implementation phase as these oversights produced huge budgetary consequences. This exercise also showed the level of administrative irregularities in the decisions taken as per the recruitment process used by the Census Office in implementing the Census.
Furthermore, the census enumeration took approximately six weeks to complete, causing an additional burden to the Census Office because of its logistical and unplanned financial implications and more importantly, numerous claims for outstanding payments that enumerators continue to present in the Census Office. At certain points in time, the Census Office was at the edge of being held hostage by enumerators withholding forms from Guadalcanal in order to obtain their perceived or actual outstanding payments.

### 4.1 Project budget

The project description for the 2009 Population and Housing Census of Solomon Islands was prepared early in 2008 and submitted through the Ministry of Development Planning and Aid Coordination. The budget total was SBD $\$ 30,424,141$ million. According to the census work plan, this budget was to be expended over a span of three year period from 2008 to 2011 the life expectancy of the census project. Overall, donor partners funded more than 77 percent of the budget, and half of their budget total was to be expended in 2009. The SIG contributed more than 22 percent of the total census budget.

Generally, costs associated with staff wages/salary and accommodation and touring allowances took up the largest share, but second largest expenditures were on survey/field equipment followed respectively by training, publicity, transport, equipment and others. Refer to Appendix 2 for the summary break down of donor partners' contribution and the total annual budget to be expended between 2008 and $2011^{4}$. The budget amount lines by donor partners including SIG may have changed during the actual expenditure period.

### 5.1 Geographical division

Data collection, tabulation and analysis were based on the administrative boundaries as defined in the Report of the Constitutional Boundaries Commission 1995/6 review. This consists of a hierarchical system comprising three different levels:

- The national level; Solomon Islands
- The provincial level: nine provinces plus Honiara City Council
- The ward level: 183 wards divided over the ten province level entities

For field operational purposes the whole country was divided into 1,344 enumeration areas (EAs) which were defined within the ward boundaries, thus constituting a fourth level. Although the division into EAs does not have any official administrative status and differs per census, it may serve as sampling frame for specialized surveys during inter-censual periods. Appendix 12 provides the country map that gives the geographical divisions of provinces, wards and EAs.
Within the general geographical division, census information can also be derived for constituencies an intermediate level between province and ward, essentially by combining a number of wards. The constituency boundaries are inclusive in the maps provided in Appendix 12. Also, Village information is also a characteristic of geographic division with a three digit code in the database. The village however is not part of the general identification code; villages are not part of the official administrative entities as they rely on subjective definitions by inexperienced field enumerator, and tend to change in terms of composition, location and name.

### 6.1 Mapping

The objective of this component was to ensure that the maps provided complete coverage of the country were designed to avoid omissions, double counting, to accommodate a reasonable workload of one census enumerator, and that geographic identifiers could be used for dissemination purposes by the PopGIS system.
Collaborations with the Ministry of Lands began in 2008 to ensure that digitized maps for Solomon Islands to be used for 2009 Census. Under this partnership arrangement, Department of Lands provided up-to-date aerial photograph maps for Honiara, including all other provincial centers throughout the country. In addition, the GIS unit in the Department of Lands provided mapping data of roads, rivers, building, schools, clinics and many more.

[^2]Mr. Samson Kanamoli who is in charge of Census Cartography received preliminary training from the frequent visit by Mr. Scott Pontifex from the Secretariat of the Pacific Community (SPC) in Noumea who also assisted him to ensure that quality digitized maps were prepared. In March 2009 the household listing exercise was conducted, to enhance redesigning of existing EA maps that might have changed over time. This is done by amalgamating or splitting to achieve an average of 60 households per EA, this is also gauged against travel time by enumerators as the size of an EA is a definite factor. EA mapping updates through the household listing exercise includes the name of household head, the total number of males and females, the households GPS waypoints, and the total number of males and females ages 17 and above. The latter is an important population requirement by the Electoral Office to foresee the probable estimated total of eligible voters of 18 years above during the 2010 general election.

Conversion and download of the household GPS waypoints and further uploading onto software like MapInfor8.1, ArcGIS9.3 and DNR Garmin, had enabled the capture and processing of geospatial data such as polygon, lines and points that enhance necessary adjustments, production of maps layout, and templates. This actually had supported and facilitated the re-design of the EA boundaries. The EA boundary-lines were clearly identifiable by permanent or semi-permanent structures like road, rivers, ridges and streams. Altogether the re-design exercise accumulated a total of 1,344 EAs an absolute increase of 195 EAs from the existing 1,149 EAs in the 1999 census.

The provisional maps for the Pilot census are produced in July 2009. This is followed by the production of single EA maps for the whole country in preparation for the census enumeration to start on the $9^{\text {th }}$ of November 2009. The maps for all rural areas were produced on the scale of $1: 10,000$ and the urban area maps were produced on the scale of 1:5,000.

In addition, the sophistication of the softwares used had enabled quick spot checks on household omission and duplication on the census database. This is possible by merging map GPS identification code with GPS identification in the census database using both the household listing and the census databases, essentially it also serve to balance out the loose end for both databases. This certainly ease manually checking of forms not yet scanned but wrongly registered had been scanned to be processed and deletion of duplicates. Technically the GPS technology was also used to link census questionnaire with geo-reference households and EA boundaries. This technology will remain confidential in the SINSO however its importance would be the possible identification of households that assumed to have been missed during census enumeration.

### 7.1 Questionnaire design

Important criteria were seriously observed leading to the formulation of the census questionnaire. The stem of these criteria were to meet the users' needs, data quality requirements, and the ability of the general public to provide the information. The design and the language or wording of the Census forms needed careful development and testing. The 2009 Population and Housing Census questionnaire consisted of two parts, the first part covers person information and the second part covers household characteristics.

The census questionnaire design team reviewed the Pacific Islands model questionnaire together with the 1999 census questionnaires, as the first step in formulating the 2009 Census questionnaire form. The first draft of the questionnaire was distributed to all stakeholders, including Government and non-government organizations and members of the steering committee, to aid them in identifying their policy issues could be addressed by questions on the first draft. Invitations are also made for them to bring forward unaddressed policy issues to the users' committee meetings for consideration. Importantly decision of question inclusion by stakeholders was smoothed by other data sources available. The content of the questionnaire was
to be discussed and finalized within the users committee with stakeholders, whereas the questionnaire design was the role of the SINSO in collaboration with SPC.

Subsequent to considerable discussions regarding the questionnaire content in the users committee the design was finalized by SINSO and SPC and the final draft was sent to Australia for printing, in preparation for the Pilot Census in August 2009. Following the Pilot test a few important changes resulted from different perceptions the respondents had regarding the interpretation of questions are made. The amendments includes re-ordering of the labor force questions, alignment of the children ever born questions boxes, re-wording of the person and household questionnaire including field length improvement in the household questions and the inclusion of the second visit check box question. These were generally the amendments made after the Pilot census. When all amendments are updated the final copy of the questionnaire was sent to Australia to be printed ready for the census enumeration in November 2009.

### 8.1 Household listing

Prior to the establishment of the census office in September 2008, a Village Resources Survey was conducted in 2007/2008. One of the main objectives of the VRS was to derive up to date population estimate and the number of households in each EAs that would assist re-designing of EA boundaries with an average of 60 households or 350 persons the defined workload per enumerator during enumeration. Initially the Household Listing component of the census was not included in the census project document, the assumption being that the existing VRS would serve this purpose. Upon closer inspection of the nature of data collected in the VRS it was found that the VRS would not match the requirement of the HhL.
The household listing involves the design and printing of household forms, preparation of training manuals, recruitment, training of the field and supervisory staffs, logistical arrangement, and data scanning activities commenced in April 2009. A training manual was prepared and a series of training sessions was conducted for seven CDS, twenty-nine CAM, and one hundred and four household listing field officers. It is also important to note that in different activity areas the census office consultative and dovetail activities were done to accommodate the end objective of each activity focus.
Subsequent to the household listing exercise, the GPS waypoints provided update information to create new EAs by re-drawing the boundaries of existing ones. A total of 195 new EAs were drawn increasing the number of EAs 1,344 in 2009 census. The mapping was undertaken to ensure that EA boundaries were clearly demarcated and consists of cluster of approximately 60 to 80 households each. The majority of EAs matched this profile though some exceeds 100 households. This census mapping work will also benefit subsequent analysis and geographical presentation of statistics and in general for future surveys.
Besides the GPS waypoints, the Household listing exercise also collected information on household head, population by sex, population seventeen years and above and a household sticker number assigned to the household. The information advantages assumed on the aforementioned attributes are important in their own right and serve respective targets. Basically the household head and the sticker number assigned to the households serves almost the same purpose that is, it would be employed as a quick identification and cross examination of households with the census listing. The population by sex provides a rough estimate of the population assumed to be enumerated during the census that make important reference for planning and the seventeen years and over was specifically collected for the Electoral Commission in preparation for the general election in August 2010. This provides the backup data source from which to derive the number of eligible voter as of mid-2010. To this extent the household listing included a count of seventeen years and over who would be eighteen years old by the time of the election.

The handheld GPS units were utilized in the training that was conducted by SPC and deployed when conducting the household listing exercise. Technically the GPS technology was also used to link census questionnaire with geo-reference households and EA boundaries.

### 9.1 Pilot census

The pilot census is conducted in August 2009 in nine provinces and the exercise was assumed to go through all the activities of full census in November 2009. The activities includes preparation in terms of publicity, training, mapping and development of relevant documents logistics and financial arrangements, enumeration and supervision, as well as the whole process of data checking, registration, coding, scanning, verifying, editing, batch editing and the tabulation of results.

The pilot census questionnaire was drafted with the census user committee. The questionnaire was later reviewed by SPC, CO, and SINSO where the designs and formats were finalized to ensure data processing meets the scanning requirements. Eighteen pilot enumeration areas were selected from nine provinces; one in Choiseul, two on Western, one on Isabel, one on Central, three on Guadalcanal, three on Malaita, two on Makira, one on Temotu, and four in Honiara. Following a one week training period, the pilot census was carried out in the period from $17^{\text {th }}$ to $30^{\text {th }}$ of August 2010, with the reference night of $9^{\text {th }}$ to $10^{\text {th }}$ August. The pilot census resulted in the enumeration of 6,371 people in 1,184 households. All pilot returns were processed and tabulated in September 2009.

The general conclusion of the pilot census evaluation was the essential structure for the full census was in place and ready to go. However, the purpose of the pilot exercise pauses required improvements on specific areas that were identified. With respect to training emphasis on the intensive feedback, extension of the training period and practical exercises were recommended. The pilot exercise also enabled valuable suggestions for improvement in interviewing, supervision, equipments, and maps. The questionnaire was revised through reordering, rephrasing questions, and improvement of the skip procedures. Some questions are removed and some new questions were added. The final draft of the questionnaire was fixed into an extra large A3 size paper with questions embedded on both sides ready to be sent to Australia for printing after the final leg with the census users' committee.

### 10.1 Organizational structure of census office

The census organizational structure is designed to implement a number of interrelated activities let alone the census operation. Major activities areas such as the field operation, the office support service, the questionnaire design and training, the data processing and accounts. Each of these activity areas, report directly to the Census Commissioner. The census enumerator manual provided guidelines of communication channels and processes on all activity areas generally to harmonize and to control the quality of downward and upward communication and the measures to follow in solving problems at all levels ${ }^{5}$. The challenge for the managers was developing a work environment that would enable census personnel to perform all these tasks with a common goal in mind.
The CC is responsible to the Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Finance and Treasury through the Government Statistician. Collaboration with other ministries, provincial governments and nongovernmental organisations were either by direct contacts or through the Census Users Committee. The Census Office remain a separate office from the SINSO to allow the latter to continue its own programmes in the years 2008 to 2011, but a close symbiosis between the two offices is essential. The Census Office draws heavily on Statistics Office staff to help in capacity development and to

[^3]gain valuable experience. Contacts with the aid donors were channelled through the Ministry of Development Planning and Aid Coordination at the initial stage however the United Nation for Population Activities UNFPA office in Honiara remain to be the disbursing office for all Donor funds and supports ${ }^{6}$.

### 11.1 Staffing and recruitment

The CC seconded from the SINSO was supported by a Secretary, Census Statistician, Cartographer, Census Operation Manager who was contracted, Data Processing Manager, and a Finance Officer seconded from SIGAS ${ }^{7}$, all of whom were Solomon Islanders. Overall, thirteen SINSO staff worked for the Census project including the CTA, two public servants were seconded from other Government departments, one from Lands department to assist the census cartographer and the finance officer from the MoFT, and four SINSO casual workers. In addition, there were 4 other census contracted workers, 7 CDS, 29 AM, 9 Master Trainers, 60 trainers, 395 supervisors and 1,592 enumerators. Census data processing recruited 26 data verifiers. The data verifier recruitment was enclosed to enumerators and supervisors who worked Honiara during the enumeration. The number contracted over the period was reduced with the workload. Various census activity recruitments mentioned above were conducted at various times.

### 12.1 Publicity

The main objective of publicity was to ensure the general public understood the benefits of the census, why each person was required to take part and to know how, when and what they needed to do to take part. The task determined to obtain an understanding and the cooperation of every individual in the country through effective use of publicity to ensure quality of responses required by the Census. To achieve this, the publicity officer established a publicity framework. This included TV and radio programs, talkbacks, posters, newspapers articles, banners, T-shirts, and ID cards.

Banners and posters were used to display the Census slogan, "Kaontim Mi, Kaontim Iu, Kaotim Everiwan" and the dates of enumeration period and census night. Similarly, T-shirts were printed with a similar content as the banners to promote awareness about the Census. This also includes the Census Office, official letter head inscribed with the census slogan "Kaontim Mi, Kaontim Iu, Kaotim Everiwan"and the date of the census night.

### 12.2 TV and radio programs

Prior to the census enumeration the general public was informed about the census progress and the need for their cooperation during the enumeration period. During the last two weeks just prior to the enumeration, the programs were used to brief the people of Solomon Islands about the nature of the questions that the census enumerators would be asking. The programs ran for two weeks during the census collection period.
Coverage of live interviews were made with the Census Commissioner to better inform the general population as to why census taking was important and to clarify the cloudy discernment of the people about the census. One news TV and radio stations followed up with the briefing on the correct meaning of the questions on the forms. The general aim of this activity was to minimize the respondent burden, and to brief the general public of the questionnaire before the actual enumeration.

### 12.3 Talkback

Talkback shows were conducted through the Solomon Islands Broadcasting Corporation and FM Stations. The programs assisted public perception and awareness on the complexity of census operations, and valued respondent contribution by responding positively to the questions during the enumeration. The public responded positively during the program.

### 13.1 Training

Several different training programs were conducted in Honiara leading up to the census proper training. Soon after the recruitment of CDSs and AMs, the initial training conducted was for the household listing. The second training was for the Pilot Census and third was for the trainers who would later train the supervisors and enumerators throughout the country. Consecutive trainings supported the assumption that the CDSs, CAM, AM, trainers, and quality control officers to enhance performances. Most if not all recruited especially master trainers and trainers, quality control officers and even data processing verifiers have engaged in one or two of the many trainings. The training for the census proper was conducted in the provinces. In total forty training venues were identified in the provinces and a total of 60 trainers were recruited and are trained by nine master trainers.

The first drafts of the census questionnaire and the manual are important documents for the Pilot Census training. Of equal importance were the tact and the magnitude of the training executed for output that also had impacts on the quality of recruitment. The Pilot training in Honiara was conducted by SPCs Demographer, Mr. Arthur Jorari and the Census Statistician Ms Irene Kalauma. The Pilot census was conducted in August 2009 for two weeks. Following the Pilot Census results, amendments to the questionnaire form and the manual are done. The Trainers training took place in Honiara for two weeks and the training of supervisors and enumerators were done in respective identified venues in the provinces. The structure and implementation of the training program were managed by the training and field operation with close communication with the CDSs and AMs to ensure that the training program in all venues throughout the country received all the necessary training resources and equipments on time and to convene the training at the same time. The administrative arrangements and support at the training venue was supervised by AM. The trainers were instructed (when in doubt) to refer all queries and technical questions raised during the training to the training team in Honiara for clarification. Moreover, it is important for uniformity therefore the training team in Honiara had to inform all trainers for any major instruction clarity or change that had been made.

A four week training program was scheduled for supervisors and enumerators in October, an equal spread of two weeks training period, with the former taking precedence. However, the training was conducted over a span of three weeks only. This change did not have any effect at all to the training. Actually the second week of supervisor training was merged with the enumerator first week of training. This had allowed an advantange in time that extended the practical enumeration, checking and group discussion period during the training. There were in total 60 trainers spread across 40 different Training venues across the country with participants at each training venues, ranging from 50 to 90 , practically some areas had more participants than others. In total there were 1,987 participants, deduced to be 395 supervisors and 1,592 enumerators.

The identified training venues throughout the provinces followed certain criteria and one of the main criteria was to have the training venues located in the central area of the assigned wards to the Area Managers. This certainly allowed speedy distribution of enumerators and supervisor to their assigned EAs at little or zero cost. However, for special case areas such the remote Islands
like Lord-Howe, Tikopia and Anuta, a separate training was conducted for the teams in Honiara as the enumeration work plan was compromised with the monthly shipping services to the Islands.

### 14.1 Field Operation

Tactfully, field operation was the gateway for data capture therefore much consideration and decision concerning this issue was important. Initially the recommendation for recruitment of the CDSs, AMs, Supervisors and Enumerators and the Quality Control officers to work in different localities were importantly considered to be the locals from the areas. In that regard, the local knowledge of the EA boundaries and the people of the areas was an asset to the operation. In addition, the local languages, customs of the diverse culture in the country was equally important in this arrangement. Similarly, the recruitment of the enumerators would have been of the same arrangement, but preferably a resident of a particular EA. This arrangement in particular was identified to be a way forward to also ensure proper monitoring of census funds through accommodation allowances and payments etc.

Throughout the country the size of EAs' were not the same as there were some EAs with households clustered together while others with households scattered. The EAs with scattered households during some occasions required the enumerators to spend nights out from their usual residence to capture information and this allowed for accommodation allowance is paid. Nonetheless, this arrangement was not practical in some areas because Enumerators who were engaged were not residents of the EA.

Supervisors on average are assigned with five enumerators to monitor as closely as possible during both rounds of the visits. They were to check interview standards, completeness and consistency of the questionnaire. Where information was missing or serious mistakes were noticed, they were expected to send enumerators back to redo the interviews or otherwise passed the questionnaire to the quality control process.

Further, to avoid enumeration omission and overlapping, the supervisor initially organized his or her enumerators to settle into their respective EAs and leaving them after clearly identifying EA boundaries, noting that the responsible enumerator should visit and enumerate all households. In practice, each enumerator was responsible to complete an EA with an approximate workload size of at least 60 households estimated to be about 350 people. This was an estimated workload to be covered by the enumerator over a period of two weeks during the first visit.
However, in actual practice supervisors made preferable change to this arrangement by grouping the enumerators in two or three or the whole team of five enumerators to complete one EA at a time until the workload of the team was completed in the first visit. This was assumed to help the slower enumerators. Where possible, the enumerator and the head of the household were to arrange a mutually convenient time for enumeration to take place during the enumeration period, from the $9^{\text {th }}$ to the $22^{\text {nd }}$ of November 2009. This was to ensure that the enumerator would minimize repeated visits to the households and that the households would be prepared and available to spend enough time to answer the questions. In addition, timing of the visit to the households especially in urban areas like Honiara was programmed to be after official hours and or in the evenings when the head and the members of the households were present.

The second visit to the households on or after census night on the midnight of the $22^{\text {nd }}$ of November 2009 was much straightforward compared to the first visit in terms of the workload. Because it was impossible for an Enumerator to visit all the households in an EA on Census night, the enumeration was spread over a longer period, both before and after the actual Census night. The aim was to record the population as if,
suddenly, at one minute to midnight, everything came to a complete stop and the population stood still ready to be counted. The reference date best known as the Census night allow the population to be counted.

### 15.1 Data processing

It was necessary that the various phases of the data processing were planned and implemented to ensure that the questionnaire was designed and formatted to permit accurate and complete data capture.

When decision was made for the census data processing system to be undertaken through scanning, the officer in charge of the census data processing, Mr. Douglas Kimi attended a two weeks scanning demonstration and training in Port Vila, Vanuatu in January 2009. The training was organised by SPC, who also provided a resource persons GIS Specialist Mr. Phil Bright and the Managing Principal of International Solution Group, Scanning Consultant Mr. Stephen Ladek. Following the training, important alignment were made to the questionnaire design according to the scanning format. Processing census data through scanning is new in the South Pacific Region. It was first introduced in the 2006 Fiji Census and was found successful. This would be the second time it was used in the region to respectively process or scan the census questionnaires for Vanuatu and the Solomon Islands in their 2009 Census undertaking.

The scanning software application automatically captures and manages information from questionnaires. FORMS software scans, interprets, and verifies the forms then transfers the data to the target system. Under the sophisticated scanning procedures of FORMS Software the creation of form definition in the manager module is quite detailed and usually takes the most time of all the enveloped stages in preparing for production. This included the adjustment of scanner settings, scaning a blank form or reading an image file, saving the form definition, defining adjustment fields, defining recognition field; if needed, defining all other fields, specifying options and validation routines, and checking the validity of the form. These with all the rest of the modules mentioned above were made possible with the frequent visit made by Mr. Phil Bright, GIS Specialist from SPC who worked closely with the data processing officer to setup the census scanning system.

Training for census data processing activities started in February 2009 with household listing, the Pilot Census and the census proper executed in that order. The questionnaires designed for the sector activities mentioned above were actually done on a dove-tailed basis though the order of priority was referenced to the effective date of each sector activities. For example, the household listing was done in March, followed by the Pilot Census in August, and the census proper in November 2009. For both the household listing and the pilot census, four data verifiers were respectively contracted and for the census proper twenty-six data verifiers were engaged.

Important data quality requirement were emphasized in all respective census trainings to ensure completeness, accuracy and consistency of data recording. Scanning required writing legibly in the space/box provided and this also emphasized. Essentially, the interaction between the supervisors and enumerators during the field operations was relevant. In addition, EA Quality Control form was to be completed by all field enumerators for each EA. The form was compulsory as it was part of the batch (EA) administrative identification procedures in data scanning processing although it was not included in the database. The quality control form only contained summary information such as EA identification, total household completed, enumerators name etc, thus it can be used as a quick spot check on the number of household against the household listing.

Administrative handling of completed forms was an important data capture procedure after the enumeration. An intensive registration procedure was enforced to administer and to monitor the
movement of completed forms from the field to the Census Office and the data processing unit. Furthermore, the data processing unit equally introduced a strict handling management procedure that checked on forms received and forms scanned in a registration log book. In addition, appropriate furniture was in placed to assist the facilitation of forms handling, transfer and processing.

There were in total twenty-six data verifiers recruited that were part of the census data processing team. This total excludes the data processing manager and the data processing supervisor. All twenty-six verifiers were full time data verifiers. However, three best verifiers who were actually involved in the scanning process of household listing and pilot census were selected to assistant the data processing supervisor in the early stage of data processing work.

The data verifiers were divided into two teams of 13 persons. This is to support the census work plan of double stream of verifiers to processing data up to seven hours a day for each team. However, this arrangement did not eventuate due to the workload of completed census forms returned that needed to be coded before passing through scanning. And because the scanning process was the fastest activity in the scanning module, decision had to be made to allow consistent feed flow of forms through the scanning process. Thus the two teams were later arranged to take turns between verifying data and coding of the census forms. Scanning and verifing activities hit the target time schedule, in completing the activities before the scanning license expired on $16^{\text {th }}$ of May 2010.

The designing of data dictionary, data entry screens, edit specifications, batch edits, tabulation plans and all related data processing systems were implemented comprehensively and according to schedule. All the designs were done in CSPro except for edit specification that was done in Microsoft Access. Accordingly, the database was further transferred to CSPro for batch editing and Tabulations. The batch editing and tabulation processes were supervised by SPCs Data Processing Specialist, Ms. Leilua Taulealo. Further editing and validation was still required and thus the expertise of Dr. Michael Levin was engaged. His assistance finally resolved the data inconsistencies and completed a datset for analysis.

### 16.1 Challenges

Numerous challenges were encountered by the census project during the field operation phase. The problems were mainly related to the management of the project work plans and funds. The latter was further worsened by the short-falls of funds disbursement by the donor partners. The poor management control of the scheduled census work plans and activities leading up to the census proper, including the census mopping enumeration was clearly evidient.

According to the specified census work plan budget in the original census funding document, the AusAID and UNFPA components of the census funds have not been stringently disbursed. Also, AusAID reduced its funding by AUD500, 000 which equated to SB $\$ 3.3$ million. Further to this, UNFPA and UNDP funding have been very elusive to track. These have affected the overall census budget and caused delays in making census work related payments on time.

Other challenges included the unbudgeted extension of the household listing, which was supposed to cover only two months but subsequently went on for seven months; the post enumeration mopping exercise which involved an unjustifiable substantial number of census enumerators, all the area managers, trainers, master trainers and the Census District Superintendents. This exercise was seriously unbudgeted for and showed the lack of appreciation of the need to adhere to project work plans, financial rules and regulations during the project implementation phase as these oversights produce huge budgetary consequences. This
exercise also showed the level of administrative irregularities in the decisions taken as per the recruitment process used by the census office in implementing the Census.
The recruitment of census enumerators resulted in negative media attention in the Island Sun ${ }^{8}$ newspaper on the $6^{\text {th }}$ of October 2009, "On doubts over progress by census workers due to slow release of funds for salary and living allowances". Further, a feature story on Ponte ${ }^{9}$ News of 28 October 2009 on biased selection of enumerators by the census recruiters; and a newspaper article in the Solomon Star ${ }^{10}$ of 24 November 2009 on the census worker threaten to strike for reason of non-payment of their allowances. Press releases added to a climate of allegations and distrust that challenged the commitment of all partners concerned with the satisfactory implementation of the census.
A Census project management committee (CPMC) was established to ensure that management issues were identified and adequately addressed, however the discontinuity in its operations combined with, the prolonged absence for personal and medical reasons of the Census Commissioner added considerably to the managerial tasks taken on by CTA and census team. Reinstating the CPMC required a new TOR to be developed in order for the committee to reconvene at monthly intervals for the remaining duration of the census project.
The Audit undertaken in accordance with UNFPA's standard procedures of annual auditing of co-financed project budgets exceeding US $\$ 100,000$ recommended stronger management by Census Office and Treasury Department to ensure that impress account holders comply with SIG's financial system and regulations. A fully accountable an operational mechanism for receiving large amounts of cash for immediate disbursement in special circumstances such as census enumeration needed to be identified, thereby taking into consideration that the great majority of the enumerators and people involved did not have access to appropriate banking systems ${ }^{11}$. Also, "the Census Commissioner was administratively not in control of the funding aspect of the project, hence he was not in a position to manage the funds in his capacity as the manager of the project and did not alert Treasury on overdrawn of special impress account which SIG later recovered the overdraft" ${ }^{12}$

### 17.1 Way forward

The CPMC meeting resumed on the $17^{\text {th }}$ March 2010 and highlighted the need for all development partners to be updated with relevant information on the census progress and expenditure reports by government. The Census Office was relocated to SINSO on the $30^{\text {th }}$ of May 2010 to curb funds spent on rental and to closely manage the office.
The Census Commissioner, Mr. Willington Piduru completed his service as a civil servant who formally retired in 2008 but was on Fixed Term Appointment FTA to complete the census project. The CC is succeeded by the Deputy Government Statistician (DGS) (Acting) Mr. Douglas Kimi, who was also appointed to take up the position of the Census Commissioner. By the end of September 2010, training of the new CC and the Finance Officer of the Census Office was conducted in such areas as: internal financial procedures and management, and budgetary control and oversight with respect to donor and SIG financial system. UNFPA provided training on UNFPAs Annual Work Plan AWP, FACE and HACT and the government through MoFT providing the SIG procedures.

To ensure that the census results are widely disseminated, a census dissemination strategic plan was developed and put in place. The dissemination strategy would include classical modalities such as data users' workshops as well as new technologies such as web-based data dissemination. As part of plan, the new CC who was also the DGS attended the Second Regional Training/Workshop on Population Census Data Analysis Using REDATAM from $8^{\text {th }}$ to $12^{\text {th }}$ November 2010, at the Statistical Institute for Asia and the Pacific (SIAP-ESCAP) in Chiba, Japan. It is now planned that the Census information will be disseminated though the REDATAM facility, website, hardcopy reports, CDs, and also through provincial dissemination workshops.

## Part 2: Table Specification

The tables included in this summary report represent the questionnaire of the Solomon Islands 2009 population and housing census. Exclusively, the tables are processed with the assumption that they can be used by wider audience. However, they are specifically meant for users with some statistical background such as planners, researchers, specialists, and donor representatives.

The set of tables presented here adheres to United Nations principles and recommendations for population and housing censuses to ensure a consistent standard of comparability with the previous censuses. There have been some slight changes to the numbering and ordering of the tables in each group and the titles may have been changed due to the structure and the format of the tables processed. It is important to note that the table numbering starts with a ' P ' for person tables and ' H ' for household tables.

This volume contained 99 tables distributed into major groups, the persons and the household tables. The person tables comprises of 72 tables and 27 household tables. The person tables are further divided into 8 various subject matters.

1. Geography
2. Age structure
3. Social characteristics
4. Migration
5. Health
6. Education and literacy
7. Labor force
8. Demography

The information presented in the volume refers to the population enumerated on the census night at midnight on the $22^{\text {nd }}$ to $23^{\text {rd }}$ November 2009 in the Solomon Islands. It was wholly the intention of this volume to meet users' basic information needs.

| Economically active | Comprises of those who were either engaged in a full or part-time job or in a <br> business, engaged mainly in farming, fishing or handicrafts making, or mainly in <br> housework with some farming, fishing or making handicrafts, who had a job but <br> was on leave or temporary absent for some reason, and the unemployed. |

Household head The person with the primary authority and responsibility for household affairs. This person is usually designated by the members of the household.

Industry

## 1. Checklist

Check that you have all the necessary materials:

- Household lisiting instruction manual. This information tells you how to record information and conduct household listing exercise.
- All Enumeartion Area maps. These maps show all the areas where you must visit households. These maps have a boundary and an Enumeration Area number of the area you will work with.
- Stickers. Put stickers onto the household somewhere visible (door or wall) and also put the detachable part of the sticker onto the household listing form. This number will be linked to the GPS location.
- GPS units. The GPS is used to take a location (waypoint) of each individual household.
- All household listing forms. The forms need to be filled with all the information about the household we are collecting.
- Black (felt tip) pen and pencil. The pen is used to write on the form. If you have problems with the pen leaking use your pencil
- Exercise book. Put all your important thoughts or experiences so that this can help make the census work better.
- Spare batteries (AA size). These are put in the GPS when the batteries run flat.
- Official notice for the census where it says what you are doing for the household listing. This notice explains the household listing and census work and why it is important.
- Census ID badge with name and ID number
- Plastic zip bag for carrying all household listing forms. You can put all the forms inside so that they don't get damaged or wet.
- Clipboard. Used to write on the forms
- All census codes for Province and Wards
- 


## 2. What is Census?

Census is used to find out information about all the people of the Solomon Islands (Men and Women) and where and how people live. The Census aims to count every person throughout the whole of Solomon Islands

This means we count:

- every Man
- every Woman (child)
- all visitors or tourists that stay in Solomon Islands.


## 3. What is a household?

Household means the places where everyone sleep cook and eat food together all the time. It means that there are different ways people lived. These include;

- All sleeping houses
- All school domatories
- Temporary dwellings which people used to lived in for a short period of time. These dwellings can be for working purposes only or garden houses etc.

A household consists of a person or a group of related or unrelated personm who live together in the same dwelling units, who acknowledge one adult male or female as the head of the household, who share the same housekeeping arrangements, and who are considered to constitute one unit. In some cases one may find a group of people living together in the same house, but each person has seperate eating arrangements; they
should be counted as separate one-person households (also require two GPS location points). Collective living arrangements (e.g. - logging camps, boarding schools, or prisons) will not be considered as households.

- A man with his wife or his wives with or without children
- A man with his wife or his wives, his children, and his parents
- A man with his wife or wives, and his married children living together for some social or economical reasons (e.g. the group recognizes one person as the household head).
- An unmarried man or woman with his or her children who provides their living essentials and foods.
- Awidowed or divorced man or woman with or without children

The head of household is the person who is acknowledged as such by members of the household and who is usually responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of the household.

There are also other ways of living together (sleep together) and this is called INSTITUTION.The arrangement is different from one household. On the pilot test, we are not going to collect any information from them. These places include;

- hospitals, clinics, prisons.
- boarding schools, religious missions.
- hotels, motels and other places that accommodates tourists.


## 4. Enumeration Area maps

The areas that you are to cover are shown in the boundary line on the photo or map that indicates the place you're going to visit. Make sure you don't cross the boundary line which indicated area that you're to visit.
It is your responsibility to find out every single house that a person sleeps in the night, in the area that you're working in. You must cover every area that has been indicated on the map and locate every house. It is very important to cover all the houses no matter they're not living close to each other.

## 5. Locating the EAs

The Area Manager's will provde the listing team with a base map containing the Enumeration Area (EA) assigned to the team. Upon arrival in an EA the team should contact the local authourities living in the vicinity (maybe village or settlement) and request assistance to identify the boundaries of the EA. In most cases, the boundaries follow recognizeable natural features (e.g. streams, rivers, valleys and mountain ridges) and construction features (e.g. roads or tracks). In some cases, the boundaries may not be marked with visible features (especially in rural areas). In these cases, attention should be paid to carefully locating the EA using any local knowledge or any detailed description for EA.
Using the EA maps, listers should tour or 'canvass' the EA to determine an efficient route of travel for listing all the structures. Divide the EA into parts if necessary such as a group of structures. It is useful to get an idea of relative landmarks, public buildings (e.g. schools, offices, churches or markets). Where possible the use of Aerial Photography or Satellite Imagery has been used to create high resolution A3 maps of each EA.

Sometimes it may also be useful to create a rough sketch map as a guide when carrying out field listing

## 6. Census listing instructions.

These are the main activities that you are required to carry out during the household listing:

1. Your job is to find out every household in the area that you're going to cover.
2. Ask the name of the head of household and fill-up the household listing form.
3. Ask the total number of people who sleep in the house and fill this in the form by writing first the number of Males, Females and Total number of HH members.
4. Ask and record the total number of HH members aged 18 and over. Include Males Females and Total.
5. Place the HH Sticker on the main door or wall of the household and one sticker (detachable) with the same number on the listing form. See section 8 of the manual for detailed instructions.
6. Take a GPS location of the household. The household location is stored in the GPS and recored as the same number that is on the HH listing sticker (see section 8 ).

## 7. The Household Listing Form

It is important that the work you done are complete and accurate. Here are the instructions on how you should fill in the Household Listing Form.

## I. How to introduce yourself to a Household

When you enter one household or you are in the area of one household, make sure you meet a member of that household and give your greetings by saying:
"Hello, my name is $\qquad$ and I am working for the National Statistics Office. I am here carrying out Population Census for Solmon Islands and I have come to ask you for some information for the census which we are now carrying out throughout the country. I would like to talk to the head of this household and ask a few questions e.t.c"

Explain to them the objectives of the census and let the respondent know that the information obtained will be confidential and will only be used for statistical purposes

If the head of the household is present, go ahead with the interview, take the GPS waypoints and put the sticker on the door.

If the head of household is not available, call again later sometime or the next day when you expect them to be home or make an arrangement for you to come back and leave a message with the household members, telling them the date of your next return. And make sure you honour your promise and live up to your work programme. If again when you return the head of household is not at home you are advised to interview the spouse, failing this you should interview the next responsible member of the household and one who is a usual resident of the household in question.
Do not forget to list vacant structures as well as structures where the household members refuse to cooperate or are not at home at the time of the listing. In such cases leave some kind of explanation on the form and note this also in your exercise book.

## II. How to fill in the household listing form

Befor e you fill in the form you must remember to

- Use black pen only
- You must write in all CAPITAL letters only
- Leave one box empty to give space between two names or words.
- If you made a mistake or fill in a wrong letter, colour in that box and use the next box.

The first house you visit within your EA, you should give that household number 001. It has a space for 3 digit only. When you visit the second (2) household, you will number that household 002. Continue on until you finish all the household in that EA. When you enter a new EA you must start a new numbering again.


The space provided here is for you to put the sticker here. Peel off one sticker and put it here. See section 8 on 'How to put the sticker'


This is where you fill in the name of the household head. There can only be one head per household. Write the first or christian name first and then the second name or surname afterwards. Each box is for one letter. If you made a mistake or write a wrong letter, colour that box and write the correct letter in the next box. You must write in CAPITAL letters or PRINT clearly.


Ask how many Male live inside the household. Put the number inside the box Males: If the number of Males is less than 10 then write with a zero infront with the number. For exampleif there are two males in the household you write 02 inside the box.
Ask how many Female live inside the household. Put the number inside the box Females: If the number of Females is less than 10 then write with a zero infront with the number. For example if there are four Females in the household you write 04 inside the box.

Add up all Male and Female living in the household and write the Total number into the box called Total. If the total number HH members are less than 10 then write with a zero infront with the number. For example if there are nine members in total in the household you write 09 inside the box.


Ask how many Male aged 18 and over that live inside the household. Put the umber inside the box Males: If the number of Males (over 18) is less than 10 hen write with a zero infront with the number. For example if there are two nales in the household you write 02 inside the box.
Ask how many Female aged 18 and over that live inside the household. Put he number inside the box Females: If the number of Females is less than 10 hen write with a zero infront with the number. For example if there are four Females in the household you write 04 inside the box.

Add up all Male and Female aged over 18 living in the household put the Total number into the box called Total. If the total number HH members aged over 18 are less than 10 then write with a zero infront with the number. For example if there are nine members in total in the household you write 09 inside the box.

## Urban/Rural Classification: Urban [1], Rural [2]

Mark 1 for Urban area or 2 for Rural Enumeration Area. Urban areas include Honiara and all Provincial Capital/Towns (All urban wards are highlighted in the coding section in section 10).

## Supervisors Manual

## 1. Job Description

Under the direction of the Area Manager. the Supervisor will be expected to work closely with the Enumeration team in their respective Ward to coordinate and manage the Enumerators in the Enumeration Areas allocated to them.
As a supervisor you are responsible for the accurate and efficient completion of the census in your supervisor area.

## Pesonal Qualities

Ability to read and write in English
Be available for the whole of the Census period
Ability to manage a small team in a harmonious environment
Ability to work as a team member
Able to problem solve
Good communication skills

## Duties

- Attend Supervisor Training for the Census in your area, and be given a Supervisor position on successful completion of your training.
- Promote the Census in your area.
- Coordinate and manage the team of Enumerators allocated to you.
- Attend a Census interview with each team member during the first few days of the start of the Census.
- Inform them of any errors they are making.
- Assist with any map reading.
- Quality check Enumerators work once it is handed in.
- Follow up on any work that is not delivered to you regularly.
- Keep a close check on anyone who is not doing their job properly.
- Allocate GPS coordinates and building stickers as required
- Assist Enumerators with any problems they encounter.
- Work collaboratively with Trainers and Quality Controllers
- Hand over completed EAs on a regular basis to Area Manager
- Keep the Area Manager informed of any problems you cannot solve.
- At the conclusion of the Census collect all materials back from the field as specified.


## 2. Timelines

Oct 12 Supervisor Training starts (2 weeks)

- You are required to attend the training course in your area

Oct $26 \quad$ Enumerator Training starts (2 weeks)

- In the first week you should go through all your notes from your training and read the Enumerator manual and the Supervisor Supplement.
- You are required to attend the second week of Enumerator training so that you can meet up with your team of Enumerators.


## Nov 09Census Starts.

- Census interviewing commences.
- Check that all Enumerators are in place and operating.
- Start your check with each Enumerator to see that they are undertaking the interview in accordance with instructions.
- Discuss any problems with Area Manager.

Nov 11 Start collecting completed census questionnaires from your Enumerators so that you can do your quality control checks.

- After checking, feed back any necessary changes to the Enumerator(s).
- Make sure you give the questionnaires back to the right Enumerator.
- Don't forget to sign the back of questionnaires you have checked.

Nov 16 Report to Area Manager the numbers of questionnaires collected by Enumerators for the first week.

- Check progress of interviewers to ensure they are on schedule.
- Continue collecting forms from the field for your quality checks.

Nov $22 \quad$ Census Day

Nov 23 Report to Area Manager the numbers of questionnaires collected by Enumerators for the second week.

- Check progress of interviewer teams.
- Enumerators should by now have visited all their houses. If not they must continue interviewing.
- You may have to help where there has been a refusal or where an Enumerator is experiencing problems for houses that have a secure compound.
- Start the second tier of the Census where Enumerators go back to confirm the numbers of people in each household on Census night.
- Ensure their progress is such that they will be able to finish on the due date (Dec 4).
- Continue collecting forms from the field and doing quality checks.

Nov 30 Report to Area Manager on progress with the 'second tier' visits.

- Note that first visits to households still MUST take priority.
- Enumerators should now be well through their work with all houses in their area visited at least once.
- Collect the remaining forms for checking.

Dec $4 \quad$ This is the last day of the Census Enumeration.

- Report to Area Manager on progress.
- If any Enumerators have not finished, discuss with Area Manager how to complete.

Dec 7 Special arrangements in place as necessary to finish all census taking.

- Report to Area Manager daily. Questionnaires should be forwarded to Area Managers office for Quality Control checking.
- Hand in all equipments to Area Manager

Dec 11 All census work must be finished.

- All questionnaires should now be with the Area Managers office.


## 3. Administering Your Area

One of the main Supervisor tasks is to allocate work to Enumerators under their supervision. In most areas Supervisors will not be interviewing but will be focusing on checking maps and allocating work so that all households within the EA map boundaries are visited.
Supervisors must check the maps and be sure where the boundaries are. This will probably require them to visit the area first to check location of villages and anything they are unsure of. The Supervisor must then plan what is the best way for the Enumerator team to systematically cover the area shown on the map. The best way may be to 'sweep the area' from one end to the other on the map. Or give the Enumerator an EA to complete on their own.
You must not interview any houses outside the boundaries shown on your map. If you do there is risk of double counting with the next interviewing team. You may reach agreement with a neighbouring interviewing team to interview a house in a remote area if it is close to one on your map. If you do that, the other team will have to give you the sticker number and the other header information for the Identification Information. You should hand the completed questionnaire back to the other team to return with the correct EA.

### 3.1. Planning routes and times

1. It is the responsibility of supervisors to ensure that the census in their SA is accurate and is carried out as efficiently and economically as possible. Make individual work plans for your team using the following guidelines.
a. Aim. Enumerators will have to interview each household in their EA on census moment and after census night in the enumeration period. This will only be possible if supervisor and enumerator together plan an efficient route through the EA using the EA map and the village list in the Enumerator manual
b. Efficiency. The route within an EA should be considered from the following angles:

- Locating and covering all households in the EA,
- Time required,
- Costs involved,
- Communication between enumerator and supervisor
c. Time. Each EA may have up to 60 households that must be enumerated in the two weeks before census night. This could be a very heavy workload unless travel time is minimal. Therefore, the travel path in each EA must be kept as short as possible. Remember, interviews in the first two days will be slow, some enumerators will not work on Saturday or Sunday, the weather may be too bad to enumerate on some days, time will be lost in travel. Therefore, include at least 4 spare days in the first two weeks. Then calculate the average number of households each enumerator needs to complete every working day. Tell them to report to you if they fall behind.
d. Costs. Census staff, including supervisors and enumerators, has a duty to keep travel costs to a minimum. Travel must be organized using the shortest routes and the most cost-effective means. Most EAs can be covered on foot, by motor vehicle or paddle canoe. Enumerators should only use canoes with outboard motors (OBMs) if unavoidable and only after clearance by their supervisor. Supervisors should combine their motorised canoe travel with that of enumerators.
e. Routes. Routes should be as short as possible, adapted to the most economical travel costs and logically follow the patterns of the settlement. Wandering an unplanned routed could result in missing out houses or villages. Using one village as a centre and travelling out to other villages on a daily basis will lose time and cost money. The preferred route is for enumerators to start in one part of the EA, moving from village to village following a logical pattern. Enumerators should sleep overnight in their last village of the day and complete the first-round (census moment) enumeration before census night. Normally, enumerators will do the same route in reverse to complete the second round of interviews.
f. Two-visit system. To reduce the need for a large number of additions and deletions during the second round of visits, institutions such as hotels, hospitals, schools and ships should be enumerated just before census night. This applies to densely populated areas and anywhere where many people come and go. In this way second-round interviews can take place immediately after census night when fewer people are likely to have moved on. This will help to avoid the problem of forgetting who slept in a household on census night and minimize the number of alterations to be made.
g. Meetings and reports. To supervise the work of their teams, supervisors will need to meet individual enumerators in the field. They should set enumerator routes in such a way that their own field trips are not unnecessarily long or complicated. Enumerators will also need contact points for reporting to supervisors. Establish one or two contact points preferably close to a telephone or radio transmitter. Ask a responsible person to receive messages when you are absent. Tell this person your planned route and keep him/her informed of any substantial changes to it. Ensure that enumerators can make contact in an emergency.
h. Recording plans. Travel and time plans must be written in the Enumerator manual (inside front cover) of each enumerator before the start of enumeration. Plans should indicate routes, expected daily progress, meeting times and locations and the name and place of the contact
person (see point g.) Copy the arrangements of each enumerator in this Supervisor manual (part 5).

2. The description in point 1 is particularly relevant for rural areas. In urban areas, travel distances are usually small and enumerators will easily have opportunities to meet with their supervisor. Apart from that, most of the points raised are valid for urban areas as well and enumerators and supervisors should follow these guidelines.
3. Develop the route and time planning for each enumeration area assigned to you during the supervisor training and the period between that training and the enumerators' training. Then discuss them with the enumerators who are selected on the last day of the enumerators' training or any time earlier, if possible.

### 3.2. Transport

1. The CDS or AM will give instructions to all supervisors on travel to their respective SA. The supervisor is responsible for ensuring that they and their team arrive quickly and that enumerators move to their EAs as soon as possible. It may be possible to use a truck in some SAs and drop enumerators off at their starting points. The supervisor could then walk back along the tractor track, stopping at each EA to check the work of the enumerator.
2. The cost of transport must be closely monitored. Supervisors must use common sense. There is no point in allowing enumerators to travel in motorized canoes at considerable expense if the result is that they finish enumerating a week early, and have nothing to do until after census night. Conversely, care must be taken to ensure that enumerators can complete their enumeration on time, which may, in some instances, require expensive transport.
3. Supervisors will travel longer distances requiring more motorized transport than enumerators. However, travel on foot or by paddle canoe is the preferred option and will set a good example. The CDS will estimate all transport costs and provide an imprest account from which supervisors may give small imprests to enumerators if needed.
4. At the end of the second round of visits all enumerators must hand in all forms (whether completed or blank) in their folders and equipment to supervisors. Whether they all go to a central point or the supervisor goes to each EA is a decision for the supervisor, bearing in mind the costs.
5. Most enumerators will be from the area where they worked so no further transport will be necessary. Some enumerators may originate from other areas and the supervisor should assist them to return home. Before leaving the training course supervisors should find out from the CDS or AM which enumerators fall into this category, what their destination is and what transport should be used. Supervisors may also belong to this group. They may also have to travel to an area manager control point to deliver the forms and equipment. All these things should be checked with the CDS or AM during the training course.

### 3.3. Supervising the Enumerators

1. Supervising the work of enumerators in the SA is the most important part of the supervisor's role. The census depends on good quality enumerations.
2. Training of enumerators does not finish at the end of their course. Supervisors must continue their teaching and mentoring role throughout the fieldwork. Checking and ensuring enumerators understand their job and field operations may prevent problems arising.
3. Supervisors, as team leaders, should encourage and motive their enumerators. Support them when problems arise. Maintain an interest in their well being.
4. Make sure enumerators have read and understood their manuals and that they consult it if a problem does occur during enumeration. Be sure they know the methods of communication in case of urgent problems.
5. Check that enumerators look for new settlements or bush houses not marked on their maps or village listings. Check also that they look for people living in unusual accommodations such as stores or sheds.
6. Find out if there are any institutions in the SA. Larger institutions should be visited by the supervisor to make arrangements with the head about the time and method of enumeration.
In some institution local staff will do the enumeration. The CDS or AM will inform the supervisor, who should visit the institution to ensure that the member of staff is trained and has the necessary equipment, and who should return to check the work.
7. Make sure ships anchored in EAs on census night, or which arrive there during the week following, are enumerated.
8. Check the work of enumerators in the field to ensure that they have the correct approach to people, fill in the questionnaires correctly and stay within the time schedule.
9. Supervisors should be patient with enumerators and be prepared to repeat explanations until they are sure their instructions are understood.
10. If an enumerator is not working to standard or is misbehaving or impolite the supervisor must address this immediately.
Always make sure any discipline discussions are held in private, never in a public discussions are held in private, never in a public place. Point out the shortcomings to the enumerator and set out the ways in which he/she can improve and let him/her know that you will be monitoring performance. Make sure that the enumerator understands why. If serious misbehavior, which threatens the success or progress of the enumeration, is reported, contact the CDS or AM immediately. Ask for a replacement enumerator. If this is approved the letter of appointment, badge, imprest, questionnaire pads and all other equipment must be returned to you. These cases are very rare, normally an enumerator will be told how to improve performance and will be monitored.

### 3.4. Checking the Work

## Summary - Quality Checking Questionnaires

Collect completed questionnaires from Enumerator at least twice a week.
Undertake your quality checks as per your instructions.
Return questionnaires to the correct Enumerator.
Advise Enumerators of any corrective action they need to take.
Get assistance from Trainer if any Enumerator requires more training.
Checks are to be done by checking a sample of each Enumerators work. Generally one questionnaire in five is a good average. You will need to do a lot of checking in the first few days then ease off. If the interviewer is good, then you can check less but you must check. If an interviewer is not so good, you will have to check more. Sign every questionnaire on the back, even though you have sample checked them.

The most important questions for checking are the names, relationship, sex and age/date of birth. Make sure the Enumerator is getting these questions right. You can hurry through the other questions, but make sure the Enumerator is not skipping any without writing a response. Do NOT guess any answers yourself as this can distort the true Census results

Location Information in the header of the questionnaire is important for the scanning. However this will be checked thoroughly by the Quality Control team in the Area Managers office. Make sure that the household number has been entered and also the sticker number.

Make sure that your Enumerators have shown all new houses with sticker numbers on their maps. Maps will be taken out of the envelopes at Census HQ and given to the Cartography team to work out a GPS location.

More than One Family in Household. Check that interviewer has followed the rules for separate questionnaires where there are more than one family in the household. Remember the criteria is where families do their cooking separately. If the household listing shows one large family but under the criteria, there should be two, you will need to issue a new sticker and use a separate questionnaire for the second family.

Check your Enumerators Report Books for any problems they might have had. Communicate these to your Area Manager. List out any problems and have a team meeting say, once a week with your Enumerators so you can share the problems.

Get the information back to Trainers as quickly as possible so that the Interviewer can be retrained on the job.

### 3.4.1. Checks during the first-round enumeration

1. During the enumeration supervisors make inspection tours. The number of tours (or field trips) depends on the SA.
2. In urban areas supervisors and enumerators will meet at the start of each day. Listen to problems encountered by enumerators, suggest ways to solve them, and discuss plans for the day. Accompany at least 2 enumerators each day and check their work. Report team progress to your AM daily.
3. In rural areas supervisors may not be able to meet the whole team daily, but should still check at least two enumerators each day. In principle, supervisors should visit each enumerator at least twice during the first round of enumeration and at least once during the second round. However, they must try to make as many field trips as possible.
4. Supervisors should put every reasonable effort to see each enumerator in the first two days of enumeration. This is very important because in the initial stage enumerators are still in experienced and will encounter most problems. Moreover, once they start making mistakes they will tend to repeat them in the rest of their work. Therefore, supervisors should correct these errors in the earliest stage possible.
5. In isolated rural areas with dispersed settlements it may only be possible for supervisors to make one visit to each enumerator before census night and one quick visit after.
6. Supervisors should correct any errors by returning to the households with the enumerator and check the interview process. Some enumerators will be more efficient than others, so spend more time with the less efficient ones, and make more frequent checks on them.
7. During the inspection visit before census night, supervisors must carry out 3 types of checks:
a. Look at a cluster of 10 houses each enumerator has visited. If one or more does not display a label with the household number and date, establish whether they belong to households in house with labels. If not, the enumerator must revisit the area and interview all households again.
b. Supervisors will be present during at least two interviews per enumerator visit. Check on the enumerator's approach, whether questions are exactly asked as indicated on the questionnaire and in the manual, and whether the questionnaire is correctly filled in. For instance, the enumerator should ask the questions in the right order, respondents should be recorded in the order indicated in the Enumerator Manual instructions, certain questions should be crossed out directly after completing the household inventory because of the age or sex of the respondents, enumerators should always probe whether they recorded all people who slept in the household that night and also inquire about the special cases mentioned in the Enumerator Manual
c. Check at least 10, and if possible, all questionnaires the enumerator completed before the supervisor's visit. See point 11 of this section as well as section 4.2 on what to look for in a questionnaire check.
8. Some errors are more serious than others. For example, if a person is reported as the spouse of head of household, with 6 children born alive and 'male sex' is recorded, this is obviously wrong, but can be easily corrected from the rest of the information. However if the same person is reported as the
spouse of head of household, born in 1971, female sex but no record has been made of children born alive, this can only be corrected by returning to the household.
9. Omissions on the questionnaire are never acceptable. At any time for any person recorded on a questionnaire sheet there must be either a valid answer or a diagonal cross through the question for that person, indicating that the question is not applicable to that person. Only in a few cases can a supervisor correct omissions.
10. Supervisors can make their own corrections of 'correctable' errors using a black ball-point pen. Non-correctable errors must be noted on the top of the questionnaire page and referred back to the household. If time allows, the enumerator can return to the household before census night. If there are numerous 'non-correctable' errors the enumerator should wait until the second round of interviews to make corrections.
11. While attending an interview with an enumerator pay special attention to the following issues and questions.
a. All questions should be asked exactly as indicated on the questionnaire in the manual.
b. Enumerators should start with filling in the header, then ask the individual questions to the head of household (or another person who can act as head if the head is not present), then ask the household questions
c. H10. If the answer is H10a is 'No', enumerators should cross out questions H10b and H10c.
d. H14. If the answer to H14a is 'No', enumerators should cross out questions H14b and H14c.
e. H16. Any time the respondent mentions a death in the household in the last 12 month, enumerators should complete section $D$ of the questionnaire. If no deaths were reported, enumerators should put a diagonal line through section $D$.
f. H17. Enumerators should mention every item on the list of crops, livestock and fish that is on the questionnaire.
Anytime the respondent mentions any crop grown for sale or any fish item caught for sale (H17b), the enumerator should ask question H17c fro that item. Otherwise H17c should be crossed out for that item.
g. Household members should be recorded in the order indicated in the Enumerator manual instructions (section 3.2.3, point 7, pages 20-21).
h. Enumerators should always probe for people not listed, especially old and very young people, and persons who were not enumerated anywhere else because they were working at night, slept in women's houses or are abroad for less than two months (see Enumerator manual, section 2.5, page 11).
i. Enumerators should cross out any non-applicable questions directly after completing the household inventory for those persons who are too young or who do not have the right sex for those questions (see the Enumerator manual, section 3.2.3, point 3 on page 20)
j. P8. Enumerators should ask the complete question as mentioned on the questionnaire.
k. P12-P15. Check that enumerators ask for the Ward name or number if people's reply to these answers is 'Honiara'.
12. P12. Check that enumerators do not record the place of delivery of that person, but the place where the mother used to live at that time.
m. P13. Check that enumerators ask the full 2 questions and explain what is meant by 'usual residence' (see the Enumerator manual, section 4.3, pages 43-44).
n. P19. Enumerators should ask this question only if the respondent mentioned tertiary education in P18a. Otherwise, P19 should be crossed out (being not applicable).
o. P23. Enumerators should ask the question in full and, if necessary, explain what is meant by 'payment in kind' (see the Enumerator manual, section 4.3, page 48). Note that the full question is only mentioned in the manual. It should include the section referring to people who usually work but are temporarily absent because of holiday, illness, pregnancy, etc.
p. P24a to P26. Check that if the answer to question P23 is 'Yes', enumerators continue with P24a to P24d, cross out P25 and P26 and then continue with P27. If the answer to P23 is 'No', they should cross out P24a to P24d and continue with P25.
q. P24b and P24c. Check for these two questions that enumerators record sufficient detail so that the census office can assess the type of work and organization (see the Enumerator manual, section 4.3, pages 49-50).
r. P24d. Check that enumerators make the right calculations, People usually do not work for more than 40 hours a week.
s. P27. Enumerators should explicitly explain what is meant by 'unpaid work' (see the Enumerator manual, section 4.3, pages 51-52).
t. P28a and P28b. See comments in points q and r.
u. P29. Check that enumerators only record the biological children of the woman, not adopted children or stepchildren. Also check that enumerators probe for any children not mentioned, especially children who died. These should be recorded even if they lived only a few minutes. If the respondent never had any children, the enumerator should fill in ' $o$ ' for each of the questions P29a to P29d. The questions in P29 should only be crossed out for females born in 1988 or later and for males.
v. P30-P34. There should be answers to these questions for any female who reported having had any children in P29. Only if there were no children born to the respondent (or if the respondent is a male, or if she is a female born in 1988 or later), these questions should be crossed out.
w. H18. Check that the enumerators fill in this question after they completed the interviews with all household members.
x. Header. Enumerators should now complete the sentence. 'This is sheet $\ldots$. . of $\ldots \ldots$.... sheets' according to the number of sheets used for that household.

### 3.4.2. Checks after census night

1. During the second round of interviews supervisors should be present during at least four household interviews in each enumeration area. They have to establish that:
a) The enumerator works with red ball-point pen;
b) The enumerator uses the correction notes made by the supervisor at the top of questionnaire pages and makes the necessary corrections;
c) The enumerator reads out the name of each person in the household and ticks those who slept there on census night;
d) The enumerator deletes anyone not in the household on census night;
e) The enumerator collects and adds the information for anyone who slept in the household on census night but not at census moment;
f) The enumerator complete the following:

- Question H18,
- If necessary, the lower part of the header;
- Table D on the inside left of the questionnaire folder

2. Check at least 5 questionnaires that were completed in the second round. If in an earlier stage you found that the enumerator made many mistakes, check at least 10 questionnaires. See part 4.2 what to look for when you do the checking.

### 3.4.3. Checks at the end of the enumeration

1. After completion of the second round of visits, which may be as early as 24 November but not later than 5 December, enumerators must check their questionnaires, the hand over all equipment and documents to the supervisor. This should include the letter of appointment, identify card, completed imprest statements and cash plus all folders and questionnaires (whether blank or filled in), the manual, note pad and maps.
2. All received items should be ticked off as required in part 5 of this manual and signed by the enumerator and the supervisor. Both should retain a copy.
3. Supervisors must check all forms thoroughly before handing them over to the district superintendent, (chief) area manager or quality controller. Do this while the enumerator is still in the area. If the work is found to be acceptable the enumerator may leave. Incorrect or incomplete work must be returned to the enumerator for correction, which may mean going back to households.
4. Supervisors should complete the checking within 24 hours of the enumeration work being delivered.
5. Checks will include the following for all questionnaire folders.
a) All issued questionnaire folders are handed in and include all sheets with nothing removed ( 25 sheets per folder).
b) Province, Ward and EA numbers are correct and correspond between the questionnaire folder, Enumerator manual and questionnaire sheets.
c) The enumerator's name and number are filled in correctly on the folders and this information corresponds with the information given on the Enumerator manual..
d) All other boxes on the folder covers are filled in correctly.
e) Households are numbered serially from 001 up to the highest in the EA.
f) Village names (including those added by the enumerator) and numbers listed in the Enumerator manual correspond with those on the EA map and questionnaire sheets.
g) The questionnaire header section on the number of sheets used per household is filled in correctly.
h) Question H18 is correctly completed and these numbers are consistent with those of Table D on the inside left of the questionnaire folder.
i) Blue ball-point pen is used for the first round and red ball-point pen for the second round. Entries should be in block letters and written in the correct sections of the questions.
j) Rows for people in the household on both census moment and census night are ticked at the left side and other people are added or deleted as appropriate (in red ink).
k) The lower part of the questionnaire header is correctly filled in if necessary.
6. Supervisors will also make consistency checks of the questions in three households from each folder. Section 4.2 of this manual gives full instructions on this. Section 4.3 describes the method of scoring to determine the quality of work - whether it is of sufficient quality to pass on to the district superintendent, (chief) area manager or quality controller, or whether it must be returned to the enumerator for correction.
7. When satisfied with the work, certify that appropriate checks have been made by recording the households checked in the appropriate place of the 'Supervisor's notes' (part 5 of this manual).
8. Sign off each returned questionnaire folder in box C (File processing) on its front cover. Also, fill in the 'Equipment and document reception sheet' in the Supervisor's notes (part 5 of this manual) in two-fold, together with the enumerator and both sign the two copies. Give one copy to the enumerator and add the other one to the enumerator's documents.
9. Finally, return all census material from yourself and the enumerators to the district superintendent, (chief) area manager, quality controller or authorized person as instructed (see also section 3.4.1 in this manual).

### 3.4.4. Final checking of the questionnaires

In this section you will find instructions what to look for if you check the enumerators' work when you visit them during the enumeration period. It will also give you instructions how to rate the quality of their work. On the basis of this evaluation, you can decide whether any enumerator has to go back to his/her enumerator area to correct any mistakes or omissions.

## Error Types

1. For the purpose of the checking activity, assume that an error exists if one of the following is the case for any answer on the questionnaire:

- The question was left blank (an answer, no circle, no diagonal line).
- The question contains an answer which does not appear in the range of acceptable answers:
Example 1: The month of birth (P5b) had the answer ' 15 ' (there are only 12 months in a year).
Example 2: For a woman born in 1950 question P29 was crossed out. If the birth date is correct there should have been an answer to his question stating the number of children born to her. If she had no children, the answer should read ' 0 '.
- The question contains an answer which falls within the allowable range, but clashes with information in other questions for the same person, or it clashes with information about other persons in the same household. In other words, the answer is not consistent with the answers to other questions.

Example 1: A persons reported with the birth date June 1990 (P5) with Form 6 as the highest education (P18). If 'Form 6' is correct, probably, the real birth date of the person is closer to 1980.

Example 2: A woman reports to be married to the head of household (P3 states 'Spouse' and P22 states 'Currently married'), but the head reports not to be married (P22 for him states 'Never married). One of them had a wrong answer recorded.
2. The three types of errors can all be subdivided into two main groups.
a) The error can be corrected by using other information about this person or other persons in the household. We call this a correctable error.
Example: If the enumerator omitted the religion of one of the children in a household and if the religion of the parents and all brothers and sisters of this child were the same, we can with confidence write the religion of the parents in the blank space of the child.
b) The error cannot be corrected from other information in the household. In that case we are involved in a non-correctable error.
Example: A woman reports to have had only one child, who slept in the household at census night (P29a and P29b are ' 1 ', P29b and P29c are '0'). However the date of birth of this child as reported in P30 and P31 (because it is both the first and last child) in inconsistent with the birth date of any person listed in P5. Since the child slept in the should it should be included on the questionnaire. Therefore either the information in P5 for one person is wrong (or missing) or the information in P30 and P31 is wrong. However, on the basis of the answers provide don the questionnaire we cannot decide what the right information is.

In our checking operation we are basically only interested in the second type of error, the non-correctable answers.

## Checking

1. Checking of errors of types a) and b) requires good knowledge of the Enumerator manual. If in any doubt about the answers which are allowed you should re-read the appropriate section of the manual again. However, some pointers will be given here about the consistency checks that can be made regarding the questions in the questionnaire.
2. A difficulty of consistency checks made after census night is that consistency of characteristics of persons or a household that existed in the first interview, may have been lost in the second round of visits. This can happen because persons were added to or deleted from the households (see section 5.1, point 9 on pages 58059 of the Enumerator manual.) So in your checking work you have to look for consistency between the persons filled in with black ink and, separately, also for the persons filled in with red ink.

## General checks

1. For every question some information should be provided: either a valid (written or circled) answer or a diagonal line across the question indicating that it is not applicable. There may never be blank questions!
2. All written answers should be clearly readable and within the space assigned to the questions. None of the coding boxes may be filled in.
If the answer consists of a circled code, the circle should be neat and clear so no confusion will arise about what is the right answer.
3. All entries from the first round of interviews should be in blue and all entries from the second round should be in red.

## Checking the household questions

1. H2-H4. If a house is made of thatched walls and roof and an earthen floor (H2a-c) it should not be classified as a permanent but as a temporary dwelling (H4). Similarly, a house with concrete walls, roof and floor should not be classified as a temporary but as a permanent dwelling.
2. H10. If under H10c ' 5 ' is circled and as specification 'bush' or 'river' is given, the answer must be corrected since these types of toilets do not qualify as 'modern toilet facilities'. Therefore, H10a should state ' 2 ' (No) and H10b and H10c should be crossed out (see the instructions in the Enumerator manual, pages 28-29). If H10a is ' 1 ' (Yes), H10b and H10c should have a valid answer.
3. H11-H12. If there was no electricity in the dwelling (H11 is ' 1 '), H12 cannot give 'Electricity' as the cooking fuel used. One of the answers should be changed.
4. H14. If H14a reports that there are bed nets in the dwelling ('Yes':1), there must be an answer to questions H14b and H14c: Otherwise, if H14a is 'No', H14b and H14c should be crossed out.
5. H14/H18. The figure in H14b can never be higher than the added total of H18e and H18f unless H18 is in red. If there is an inconsistency between H14b and blue figures in H18e and H18f, check the number of persons written in blue under question P2 and correct the answer that apparently is wrong. If there is an inconsistency between H14 and red figures in H18e and H18f, leave it as it is. We will accept this inconsistency.
6. H16-D2/D3. If H16 is ' 0 ', D2 and D3 should be crossed out. If there are one or more deceased persons recorded in H16, D2 and D3 should have information accordingly.
7. H17. Check that for every crop, livestock and fish item information is given in questions $\mathrm{H} 17 \mathrm{a}, \mathrm{H} 17 \mathrm{~b}$ and H17c as far as requested. Check als that for any item for which H17b states ' 1 ' (that is, it is grown or caught for sale), there should be an answer in H17c. For any item for which H17b states ' 2 ' (that is, it is not grown or caught for sale), the corresponding lien in H17c should be crossed out.
8. H18. This is perhaps the most important question in the census. Check whether the number of males 'On this sheet' (H18a) plus those 'On other sheets' (H18c) equals the number of males 'Total in this household' (H18e). Check similarly whether the number of females 'On this sheet' (H18b) plus those 'On other sheets' (H18d) equals the number of females 'Total in this household’ (H18f).
Check also whether the figures on males and females in question H 18 are consistent with the information in question P4 which gives also the information of the number of people by sex. If there is any inconsistency, correct the answers and discuss it with the enumerator.

## Checking the individual questions

1. For every question some information should be provided: either a valid answer or a diagonal line across the question indicating that it is not applicable for that person. There may never be blank questions!
2. Check that the sequence of the listed persons in the household is correct according to the instructions in the Enumerator manual, section 3.2.3, point 7 (pages 20-21). However, do not rewrite the form to make it correct. Instead discuss it with the enumerator and instruct him/her how to do it properly.
3. Check that any questions (P15-P34) are crossed out correctly according to the date of birth and/or sex of the person. For example, a man cannot report children born to him (P29); and a child born in 1994 should not have any answers filled in questions P22 to P34: these should have a diagonal line across.
Vice versa, any female old enough (born before 1988) should have information written in question P29 and any person born before 1988 should have had all questions P2 to P28 appropriately addressed.
Check for ever person separately which questions, if any, should be crossed out.
4. P3. The 'Relation to the head' should be consistent with information about sex (P4). For example, if the head is a male than the spouse should be female.
P3 should be consistent with information about birth dates (P5). For example, if the relation is 'Child or 'Parent', there should be an age difference of at least 12 years and usually more than 14 years between those persons and the head. Also, the age difference between brothers and sisters should be at least 9 months, unless they are twins or one of them is an adopted or stepchild.

P3 should be consistent with information about marital status (P22). For example, if a person reports to be a spouse of the head, both that person and the head should be 'currently married'.
5. P4. There must always be answer to this question.
6. P5. The date of birth should be consistent with information on education (P18-P20), occupation (P24c) and birth dates of children (P30 and P31, if relevant). For example, a person born in 1987 will not have completed Form 6 (P18); a medical doctor (P24c) will be born before, say 1977; if the respondent is a mother, the birth date of her first child must be at least 12 years and usually more than 14 years later than her own date of birth. Also, if the child reported in P30 and P31 slept in the household, it should have been recorded with the same birth in P5.
There must always be an answer to the question on year of birth (P5a).
7. P10. If both real parents have the same ethnicity, than that of the child must be the same.
8. P12-P15: The answers should contain sufficient information to determine the Ward, i.e., it should contain the Ward name or number and the Province or island. If the answer is 'Honiara' a ward number should be included as well.
9. P24b and P24c. These two questions should have sufficient detail so that the census office can assess the type of work and organization (see the Enumerator manual, section 4.3, pages 49-50).
10. P24d. People usually do not work for more than 40 hours a week and public servants usually not more than $37 \frac{1}{2}$ hours a week. Discuss any excessive answers with the enumerator and correct the answer if necessary.
11. P25. If the answer to this question is ' 5 ' (Disabled) the person should have stated any kind of disability for question P8.
12. P28a. This question should have sufficient detail so that the census office can assess the type of work.
13. P28b. People usually do not work for more than 40 hours a week. Discuss any excessive answers with the enumerator and correct the answer if necessary.
14. P29a-P29d. For every female born before 1988 these questions should have a number. If the woman did never have any children, there should be a ' 0 ' for every question. Only for males, and for females born in 1988 or later a diagonal line across these questions is allowed.
Check that P29b + P29c + P29d adds up to P29a. Also check that the number of children 'slept here' ( P 29 b ) is consistent with the number of children of this woman on the form itself.
15. P30-P34. For every female born before 1988 who ever had a child these questions should have an answer. They may only be crossed out if the person is a male, a female born in 1988 or later, or a female who has never borne a child.

## 4. Test Procedure

## General rules

1. In order to test the quality of an enumerator's work you will select in each folder of that enumerator three households. You will take in each folder the smallest household, the largest one and one of in-between size. If any of these proves to have many crossed out answers, because of the household had to be enumerated on the basis of statements by neighbours, then you have to replace this household with another one of about the same size.
2. For each of these three households, you will go through the answers in the household module (front page) and through the rows of every household member listed. Every time you find an error you will make a mark with pencil. If you find a correctable error this mark should be a small horizontal line in a clearly visible place at the bottom of the particular answer space. If you find non-correctable error this mark should be a small cross in the same place (see Figure 3).

## Figure 3. Error marks


3. You should be careful to avoid counting the same error twice.

EXAMPLE: You found an inconsistency because one person is reported born in May 1989 (P5) - and therefore is 10 years old .. and has completed Form 3 (P18a and P18b). Now you could mark the year of birth or the completed level of education or both as wrong. Using additional information from the questionnaire you could probably decide that there is only one mistake. If the person appears to be the first-born child of a woman and the birth date is confirmed in question P30 of that woman, and it is also consistent with the birth dates of the mother and those of a few brothers and sisters on the questionnaire sheet, then you could safely assume that the information in P5 was correct. This would mean that only P18 is wrong: probably P18a should have been circled ' 3 ' for 'Standard' instead of ' 4 ' for 'Form' since that would make sense. However, what you should do in this situation is only marking P18 as one error (and not P18a and P18b). It should be marked with a's' because we assume we can correct the error by changing P18a from 'Form' to 'Standard'.
4. Below you find a few more examples of how to mark errors found on a questionnaire. EXAMPLE 1:

Suppose a woman is reported as the spouse of the head of household and her economic activity and number of children are given. If her birth year is 1990, this is not consistent with the recorded relation to the head marital status, economic activity, and children ever born. All indication are that in this example the birth year is wrongly reported. There are at numerours inconsistencies but they would all be cleared up, if the birth year were corrected. We have therefore only one error. This error cannot be corrected from the available information: it is a non-correctable error. Thus, put a small pencil cross ( $x$ ) in the birth year answer space.

## EAMPLE 2:

If the answer to question P23 for a person is 'Yes' (1, indicating the person did do paid work in the last seven days and questions P25 and P26 are appropriately crossed out, but there are no answers to questions P24a to P24d, you could count his as 4 errors (because 4 questions were omitted).However, since the enumerator probably only once overlooked the questions of P24, you may count this as one error. It should be marked with a cross because we cannot correct the answer.

## EXAMPLE 3:

Take a married woman aged 32, for whom the enumerator left questions P29a to P29b blank. This also is clearly one non-correctable error.

## EXAMPLE 4:

You find that question $H 18$ is not completed. Although this is a serious error, it can be corrected by counting the people listed on the questionnaire. Therefore, you should put one small line in the answer space of question H18.

We could study thousands of examples and we would without doubt find problems in the way the error should be marked. These cannot be discussed here, but with common sense you will be able to find an acceptable solution.

## Calculating scores

1. Once you have marked all selected households of an enumerator, make a small table in the appropriate page of your supervisor's notes referring to that enumerator. Write down the household number for each household tested (see the example in point 4 below). Count the number of persons in the household and add 1 to that number to cover the household module 3enter in the table is $7(6+1=7)$. Also enter the number of non-correctable errors. In the example in point 4 below you tested three households from each of the three folders a particular enumerator used during enumeration.
2. You then divide the total of the second column (number of persons and households) by the total of the third column (number of non-correctable errors). If the answer is 2.5 or higher, the work of the enumerators can be accepted. In our example the score will be $77 / 28=2.75$, which is a just acceptable score.
3. However, if the score is less than 2.5 , for instance 1.9 , then you should select another three households in each of the questionnaire folders and repeat the procedure. If the score calculated by adding the persons-plus-households and errors of the two sets of selected households combined still is less than 2.5 the enumerator will have to return to his /her EA to try and correct the errors.
4. EXAMPLE:

5. People tend to make the same error all the time. So to minimize errors you must explain very clearly what an enumerator has been doing wrong. Do this as early as possible, that is during your visit in the first two days of the enumeration period. Otherwise he/she may repeat them again. Be reminded that you as supervisor are responsible for the quality of the work.
6. If the work of an enumerator is found to be unacceptable, he/she has to go back to the EA. When back there, the enumerator should also revisit the households that were not included in your checks, in order to correct any errors he/she frequently made according to your checks. This, however, would be a serious matter and supervisors and enumerators should put every effort in avoiding this to be necessary.
7. Again, if you would have properly checked and coached the enumerator in the first round of visits, it would not have been necessary for him/her to return to the EA at this late stage.

## Allocating a new GPS Code

This should only be done in exceptional circumstances. In the Census, Enumerators are told to issue a new sticker where they come across a household that was not enumerated in the Household Listings earlier in the year. They should then mark that house on their map so the Cartographic team can assign the GPS codes.

## Collecting in Materials from Enumerators

On completion of the Census Interviewing, all materials need to be collected in from Enumerators. This will include:

- All questionnaires blank or otherwise. Check amongst these if there are any completed questionnaires that interviewers have forgotten to hand in previously.
- All maps are to be put in envelope with the questionnaires
- Household listings are to be put in the envelope with questionnaires

All the above items must be handed in to Area Managers.
Check that Household listings are marked with the Ward/EA codes and the Supervisor Name. Pack the household listing and map in the plastic envelope along with the completed questionnaires for each EA. If two envelopes have to be used for the same EA make sure that it is marked 1 of 2, 2 of 2 etc for each EA.

Pack all the unused questionnaires for your District together.
Interviewers may keep their uniforms, also pencils, pens and other items of stationery.

## 5. Imprest

1. The imprest can be used for:
a) Necessary transport of enumerators and supervisors,
b) Use of interpreters if no-one in your team is able to speak the local language and if Pidgin is not understood.
c) Necessary costs of communications (telephone, radio, cable, stamps),
d) Necessary costs of messengers
2. Supervisors will sign for their imprest. The money can be spent on approved items if necessary (see point 1), and if a receipt is obtained. The receipt should show the name and signature of the recipient of the money, the goods or services and the name of the person paying the money. Use the Supervisors receipt book for this purpose.
3. At the end of the enumeration complete an imprest control sheet. Full instructions are given on the back of the sheet. Total expenditure plus cash must equal the original imprest received. This control sheet, receipts and money must be returned to the CDS or AM with the census questionnaires and equipment (see section 3.4.1 above). In some cases everything will be handed over to someone acting for the CDS or AM. In this event obtain a signed receipt from that person for the imprest control sheet, receipts and cash
4. Small imprests given to enumerators must be accounted for in exactly the same way, except that enumerators will hand their control sheets, receipts and cash to the supervisors.
5. All census monies must be accounted for. Payments for unauthorized items or receipts not signed will result in delay of supervisor and enumerator final payment.

## 6. Reporting

1. There will be two reporting lines
a) From enumerators to supervisors
b) From supervisors to CDS or AM.
2. Encourage enumerators to send brief reports whenever someone goes from their enumeration village to the supervisor contact point. Do not hire messengers for these or personal messages, unless urgent. Enumerators must immediately send a message to their supervisors in cases of emergency, such as:

- Respondents refuse to co-operate,
- The enumerator is too sick to work;
- Lack of equipment that would cause delays
- The enumerator finds many additional households and needs assistance to complete the work;
- The enumerator cannot keep to the time schedule and risks failing to complete the work;
- A change in conditions materially affects plans for meetings etc.

Under these circumstances the supervisor may pay the messenger. Enumerators should not leave the EA (unless it is close to the supervisor base).
3. Reactions to enumerators that report to a supervisor must not be delayed. If remedial action is needed, any delay could jeopardize the enumeration. If anything threatens to hold up the enumeration it must be reported to the supervisor immediately.
4. Supervisors should send progress reports to the CDS or AM when someone in the SA travels to AM control points, preferably after the first and second weeks of enumeration. The CDS and AM will want reports on progress according to plan as well as on any problems. If there is a telephone or radio transmitter ask to use them for weekly reports.
5. In cases of serious emergency use a telephone or radio transmitter if one is available. Otherwise send a concise report by messengers to the CDS or AM, using the best means available. Do not leave the enumerator in isolation. Inform the contact person of your planned action and move to the EA where the problem occurred. This is the best place to investigate the issues and decide what action to take.

## 7. Equipment

4. During the supervisors' training you will be issued with the following equipment
a) An identification card and letter of appointment
b) A copy of the Census Act
c) An Enumerator Manual
d) A Supervisor manual
e) A ward map of the Solomon Islands and Honiara
f) A map of your supervisor area
g) A Supervisor's receipt book
h) A calculator
i) 2 Black ink ball-point pens
j) A pencil
k) A ruler
1) An A5 size notepad
m) An A3-size clipboard
n) A waterproof bag
o) A torch plus batteries (incl. spare batteries)
p) A plastic cover to protect the enumeration documents and equipment during transport
q) A wooden box + lock to transport enumeration documents.
5. During the enumerators' training you will receive the equipment for the enumerators assigned to you. Part of this will be issued to you at the start of the enumerators' training, the remainder at the end of the training (for those who are selected). The Enumerator manual (page 5) provides an overview of the enumerator's equipment.

It will be your responsibility to properly distribute this equipment to the enumerators assigned to you and ensure that each of them carries all equipment needed for the enumeration.
6. In addition to the standard enumerators' equipment you will receive a number of items you should carry during enumeration time as spares in case the enumerators' equipment was not sufficient or they lost or damaged their own. These items include:
a) Spare questionnaire folders (usually one per enumerator assigned to you) each containing 25 census questionnaire forms,
b) Some spare ball-point pens;
c) A spare sticker to mark the houses where people were interviewed.

At the end of the enumeration (and not later than 7 December 2009), enumerators must hand in all questionnaire folders, manuals and all other documents, equipment, letters of appointment, badges and financial statements. Everything is to be put into the enumerator's plastic bag and wrapped up. Supervisors' document and equipment must be included, except the calculator which you must keep. The supervisor then has to transport everything in the locked wooden box to the area manger control point or CDS office as instructed by your AM or CDS. There, it should be received before 11 December 2009.

## Appendix 8

## Enumerators Manual

## 1 ABOUT THIS MANUAL

This Enumerators Manual contains information about field procedures, training forms and materials you will use as a Census Enumerator. The manual provides instructions on how to carry out the enumeration of all persons and households in your Enumeration Area (EA).
Because of the detail involved, you are advised to read it through once to initially familarise yourself with the structure, timing and main task involved in enumeration and familiarise yourself with the contents of this manual, the census questionnaire, the training documents and any other materials issued by your Area Manager and Census Supervisor before starting work. Then as each phase of the enumeration arises, study the relevant section in detail before beginning that phase. Your Trainers will train you thoroughly in all aspects of your duties but when you are doing the enumeration you may find it useful to refer to the manual regularly. Please also feel free to mark this manual to help you with your job.
You will also need to be familiar with the terms and conditions of your job and the expectations the Solomon Islands Statistics Office (SISO) has of you, as set out in section of this manual.
This manual includes:

- information about what an Enumerators job is
- instructions about the tasks you have to complete
- advice on how to deal with situations that you may encounter.

We expect that with this information you will be able to work through most problems yourself. If you do come across something unusual and cannot decide what to do, contact your Supervisor for assistance. Your comments and feedback about all aspects of this Census, including your job, this manual, booklets and other documents, are valued by Solomon Islands Statistics (SISO) and will assist the Enumerators who will work on the Census in future. Please note your comments as you go, in the Census note book, and include any suggestions that you think will improve Census procedures or the job.

## 2 WHAT IS A CENSUS?

A very basic definition of a census is:
"A canvass of a given area, resulting in an enumeration of the entire population and the compilation of demographic, social and economic information pertaining to that population at a specific time". This specific point in time is referred to as the census date.

### 2.1 PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES OF THE CENSUS

Censuses are the internationally recognized method for collecting demographic and key social and economic information for every island, community, man, woman and child. National Population Censuses in Solomon Islands date back to colonial times although it was not until 1979 that an official one was conducted. Since then, it has been an activity enshrined in the Statistics Act Chapter 83 of 1974 which mandates the Solomon Islands National Statistics Office to carry out this exercise. Generally, National Population and Housing Censuses are undertaken in every 10 years. The last Solomon Islands National Population and Housing Census was conducted in November 1999. A modern population census is not just a count of people. As a basic tool for planning and assessment it must cover a wide range of topics. The questions asked on the Census Questionnaire have been carefully researched and developed; all are necessary and it is essential that all be answered carefully and completely. The essential aims of any census are outlined below:

1. The role of the population and housing census is to collect, process and disseminate detailed statistics on population, its composition, characteristics, spatial distribution and organization (families and households and
the houses they live in) at the smallest geographical level. The Solomon Islands National Population and Housing Census Project will provide the needed data for strategic planning and policy formulation such as that stipulated in the Priority Action Agenda (PAA) ${ }^{14}$ of the Solomon Islands government.
2. The Population and Housing Census play an essential role in public administration. The results of a census are used as a critical reference to ensure equity in distribution of wealth, government services and representation nation-wide: distributing and allocating government funds among various regions and districts for education, health services, delineating electoral districts at the national and local levels, measuring the impact of industrial development, to name a few. Establishing a public consensus on priorities would be almost impossible to achieve if it were not built on census counts.
3. The census also plays an essential role in all elements of the national statistical system, including economic and social components. Census statistics are used as benchmarks for statistical compilation, or as a sampling frame for sample surveys. Today, the national statistical system of almost every country relies on sample surveys for efficient and reliable data collection. Without the sampling frame derived from the Population and Housing Census, the national statistical system would face difficulties in providing reliable official statistics for use by the government and the general public.
4. The basic feature of the census is to generate statistics on small geographical areas with no/minimum sampling errors. While the statistics on the small areas are useful in their own right, they are important because they can be used to produce statistics on any geographical unit with arbitrary boundaries. For example, in planning the location of a school, it is necessary to have the data on the distribution of school age children by school area, which may not necessarily be equal to the administrative area units. Similarly, small area data from the census can be combined to approximate natural regions (e.g. watersheds or vegetation zones) which do not follow administrative boundaries .Since census data can be tabulated for any geographical unit; it is possible to provide the required statistics in remarkably flexible manner. This versatile feature of the census is also invaluable for the use in the private sector for applications such as business planning and market analyses.
5. The census results are used as a benchmark for research and analysis. Population projections are one of the most important analytical outputs based on census data; future population projections are crucial for all segments of public and private sector.
6. The census result will produce small-area detailed statistics as a building block for efficient governance at all levels. That is why it is required to conduct the census and the smallest unit of collection as possible which should result in detailed, small area population statistics for the same moment in time.
7. It will also provide information required for reporting on international commitments such as the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC), the Convention for the Elimination of all forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW), the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) and other sectoral goals.

### 2.2 Structure of the population

Information is needed on the structure of the population, for instance, the number of males and females and their ages, together with a variety of other characteristics related to their civil and economic status. Some questions, such as those about the children of females born may seem useless to some people. These are used, employing statistical techniques and computers to estimate the forces which change a population, especially fertility and mortality. This is the only way measurement of these forces can be obtained as the registration of births and deaths in Solomon Islands is far from complete

### 2.3 Economic Development

Other questions, such as those on education, migration, work and employment are used to measure the progress made over the last ten years in educating the population, in using their skills and developing the economy so that the quality of life in Solomon Islands is improved and the national development objectives achieved. The answers will provide important information to the government regarding the needs for future public services.

Successful planning for the future needs of children for schools and trained teachers, of young adults for worthwhile employment and of older people for a rewarding retirement from hard work is related to the availability of accurate information about the numbers and characteristics of these groups, now and in the projected future. Labour market data can be used to encourage new industries to establish their offices and factories in Solomon Islands and thus provide employment opportunities for our citizens.

As in the Agriculture census, the population and housing census does collect information on major carhops and livestock. Although further detail of these produce will not be collected in this census, it will be sufficient to provide a framework for development and research in the agriculture sector. Solomon Islands has more than two thirds of its population living in the rural areas with their primary activity mostly subsistence.

### 2.4 Housing

As well as measuring the number and characteristics of the people of Solomon Islands the Census will collect information on the stock of housing. This is necessary to produce information on issues such as adequacy of housing for the people living in them, the extent to which the houses meet basic standards and identify some key health issues such as access to clean water and disposal of waste.

## 3 Enumerators' duties and responsibilities

As an enumerator you will be allocated an area known as an EA in which you will be personally responsible for the enumeration of all persons in your EA by visiting every household and recording particulars required of every person, household and dwelling.
As an Enumerator, you have a most important role in the success of the National Population and Housing Census of Solomon Islands in 2009. The people of Solomon Islands and the National Government is relying on you to perform your duties as conscientiously, accurately, efficiently and honestly as you are able. No census has ever been successful without the devotion to duty and hard work of its Enumerators. You will be trained on how to do your work and it is important also that you make sure you know how to do it properly. It is essential that every citizen be counted and counted only once.

Advise your supervisor immediately if you are unable to do your work because of illness or any other reason. If all or part of the day is lost for any reason, you must find time to catch up with the hours lost.
Your duties have been broken into phases. They are:

## Before Census

In preparation for the enumeration phase you must:

- read this manual thoroughly, and familiarise yourself with the other materials provided
- attend the initial training session

During Enumeration
During the collection phase, you must:

- record and act upon all instructions by your Supervisor and Area Manager in a timely manner
-ensure that all persons who spend the night of $22^{\text {nd }}$ of November within your EA are included in the Census Enumeration.
ensure the security and confidentiality of information, Census Questionnaires and other Census materials at all times.
- regularly report to your Supervisor about your progress.


## After Enumeration

After collection, you must:

- ensure the Household Number is written correctly and neatly on all Census Questionnaires
- complete your work and account for all Census Questionnaire's
- pack and return completed Census Questionnaires, your Census Record Note Book, and other administrative materials to your Supervisor
- attend a debriefing session, if one is convened in your area.


## 4 CENSUS AS REQUIRED BY LAW

The undertaking on a census in Solomon Islands is empowered by the Census Act (Cap 53) and mandates the Solomon Islands National Statistics Office to carry out this exercise. No other institutions in Solomon Islands have got this same mandate to carry out this exercise.

The information collected in this census must remain confidential. There are penalties specified in the Census Act, Cap 53 , for persons who reveal to others about information learnt in the course of their census duties.
According to the Statistics Act -
Any person who:
(a) being a person employed in taking a census publishes or communicates without lawful authority to any person otherwise than in the ordinary course of such employment any information acquired by him in the course of his employment; or
(b) having possession of any information which to his knowledge has been disclosed in contravention of this Act, publishes or communicates that information to any other person; he/she shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to imprisonment for six months or to a fine of one thousand two hundred dollars
The only persons permitted to see or hear information taken from persons being enumerated are your Supervisor and officers in the Census organization to whom he/she reports. You are not to give anyone including friends, relatives or other enumerators, the information you get from your own enumeration area. Make sure that the questionnaires you have filled in from previous households are not able to be seen by members of the households you enumerate later. You must not reveal information even to members of your own family. These rules are necessary if the public is to have trust in the census organization and so they can be sure that information given to census enumerators is used for census and statistical work only. As such you are required to sign the Secrecy Act of the Solomon Islands Statistics Act in which you are abide by its conditions. This means you will be prosecuted and penalized if found to have broken the conditions in the act. It is also an offence to wilfully falsify any information in the data collected. All of these are subjected to prosecution.

Just as you must keep all information confidential, the nominated Head of the Household and all other persons in a Household are obliged by law (Statistics Act, Cap 83) to give answers to the information questions contained in the census schedule. Persons who refuse to cooperate with you by not answering the questions truthfully and completely to the best of their knowledge and ability should be reported by name. Do not get into arguments or difficult situations with respondents. It is not your job to enforce the law. Inform respondents of their obligations under the law, if necessary, and if cooperation is not forthcoming, give their names promptly to your Supervisor. You can be sure that these situations in Solomon Islands are extremely rare and that you are unlikely to have any trouble of this sort.

The Solomon Islands National Statistics Office is forbidden by law to give information about any person to any other person or to any other Government Department or agency. You should inform members of the public of this fact if they raise the matter of confidentiality. The public in Solomon Islands has a fine record of willing cooperation with censustakers, and this is based on past experience with trustworthy enumerators. The census authorities are extremely anxious that this situation continues.

### 4.1 SECURITY OF MATERIAL\CONFIDENTIALITY

At all times you must keep all Census materials secure, whether in the field or at home. The materials in your possession are official and confidential and should be treated accordingly. If you lose material, or it is stolen, you must report the incident to your Supervisor, Area Manager and to the police as soon as possible.
All information obtained by an Enumerator relating to individuals or households in the course of enumeration bust be treated as strictly confidential.

## REPORT ALL SECURITY INCIDENTS INVOLVING CENSUS MATERIALS TO YOUR AREA MANAGER.

### 4.2 IDENTIFICATION CARD

You will be issued with, and must sign, an Identification Card. You must wear your Identification Card at all times when conducting your Census duties and it should be shown visibly when introducing yourself to the head of household or any other person. The loss of your Identification Card must immediately be reported to your Supervisor, Area Manager, and to the police. At the completion of the fieldwork you must return your Identification Card to your Supervisor who will pass them on to the Area Manager.

### 4.3 YOUR CONDUCT

As an Solomon Islands Statistics Office representative, you are expected to maintain a professional approach at all times and to confine your relations with householders to the collection of Census information. You are not to contact or discuss any aspect of your Census work with the media. The only exception is if the Census Commissioner requests you to do so. In addition to legal obligations to maintain confidentiality and secrecy, you are bound by specific ethical considerations in relation to Census information. During your Census employment you must not attempt to sell, demonstrate, canvass or solicit interest in, or support for, any product or business, commercial, political, religious or personal activity in which you may be involved; and you must not give or mail to any householder any literature, brochures or promotional material other than that provided by the Solomon Islands Statistics. Any breach of the above by you will result in your immediate dismissal.

## 5. MATERIALS CHECK LIST

You will receive a sample kit of Census Materials from your Area Manager before your initial training session. You will be provided with the following Census forms and materials from the list below:

- Enumerator Manual
- A3 double sided census questionnaires (containing person and household questions)
- Enumeration Area boundary maps
- Certificate of Authority and Appointment as a Census Enumerator
- 2 black pens
- A3 size clipboard
- An enumerator's bag to hold all your supplies
- I.D. badge that will have your name
- 2 T-shirts for census purposes
- Household listing form that identifies households and their head of household (note: assuming this information is available)

Although reasonable estimates of the quantities of Census Questionnaires required for Enumerator Workloads have been made, in some circumstances you may run out of Census Questionnaires, or other materials. If you do run out, or you think that you will, contact your Area Manager immediately.

A yellow Enumerator Bag provided with your training kit will hold all the necessary materials for your field work. These bags are can be sealed and are fairly waterproof to protect the census questionnaires from being damaged. Use the bag at all times when involved in Enumeration.

## 6. DEFINITIONS USED IN THE CENSUS

Before embarking on the enumeration you must understand the concepts of a Dwelling and a Household. The census collects information about people not only as individuals, but also about their living arrangements, so that they can be grouped into households.
The following are the most frequent terms referred to in this documents and any census process. The people of Solomon Islands will be enumerated using questionnaires in double sided A3 size paper containing both Household and Person questions in this Census. Each Household will have its own form to which the Personal questionnaires of each member of the household will be incorporated. For this purpose you will have to determine the Household in which each person lives.

## A. PERSON

This is any individual member of the household or institution who is present on the census night and is therefore counted in the census. This includes every young and old, male of female, expatriates or residents, tourist and locals alike.

## B. HOUSEHOLD

For the purpose of this census, a household is defined as "Those persons who usually eat together and share the work of preparing the food and/or the cost of work of providing it". Normally household members also live and sleep in the same building but experience has shown this is not always so, which is why the definition is based on eating together rather than on living or sleeping in the same building.

A household may be found in a variety of forms. It may spread over more than one building. Members of a family may sleep in two or even more buildings but share one place to cook and eat. They should be enumerated as one household. The group of people in a household may consist of persons who normally live in that household but may also include visitors or guests who happen to be spending the census night there

Two or more households can be found in one building. Two or more families who share the same building but who do not normally prepare food and eat together should be enumerated as two households, e.g. blocks of flats or servants who have their own quarters (and who do not eat with the family). Households may be found in buildings intended primarily for other purposes. A family may live in the back of their shop for instance. Boats tied up to a dock or even pulled up on shore may be permanently lived in and should be counted as households. Enumerators should look out for such dwellings and enumerate their occupants as a household if they meet the definition.

Yachts in this case will be enumerated as households. Hostels are lodges and not institutions. The question Hl of the household section lists the different types of living quarters and this manual explains the difference

Note that should there be more than 6 people in a household or more, you are required to fill in two census questionnaires. Please refer to section 14 on how to fill in the questionnaire.
In doubtful cases, instead of grouping people into one household who should perhaps be separated, it is better to use two households.

## C. INSTITUTION

An Institution, for census purposes, may be defined as an organization providing specified services or performing some general public function for a group of residents or inmates who will normally be unrelated to each other. Institutions or sometimes refer to as collective households or non private dwellings such as hospitals, schools, hotels, or establishments providing a communal type of accommodation or care, such as: short-term 'apartment' motels, hostels, , nurse's quarters, boarding houses, private hotels, corrective or detention institutions (prison houses), and colleges.

Each one of these institutions must be entered on the census questionnaire along with the name of the institution (collective household) as one record and each person staying in these established are enumerated using the personal questions on the questionnaire.

Ships staying in Solomon Islands waters on the census date should be enumerated and they are classified as institutions and not households. As noted above, Yachts who are present during the census night will be enumerated as households

## D. the census date

The major objective of the census is to determine the number and characteristics of people in Solomon Islands at one particular point in time, i.e. the night of $22^{\text {nd }}$ November or, to be exact, in the last minute before the $22^{\text {th }}$ November changes at midnight. This is normally referred to as the Census Night. All persons alive in the Solomon Islands on

Census night are to be included. Children born before midnight on the $22^{\text {nd }}$ November are to be included. Persons who die before midnight on Census night are to be excluded.
It is impossible for an Enumerator to visit all households in an EA on Census Night, and certainly not just before midnight, so that the Enumeration must be spread over a longer period, both before and after the actual Census Night. However the aim should be to record the population as if, suddenly, at one minute to midnight, everything came to a complete stop and the population stood still ready to be counted. In reality you should not be disturbing people this late at night. Keep your visits to households to within reasonable hours.

## 7. PRESENT OR ABSENT

Solomon Islands is conducting a "de facto" census. This means that persons are to be enumerated in the household where they spend the night. There are likely to be problems enumerating persons moving between households during the census period. Since the enumeration has to take place over several days some persons could be enumerated in both places or possibly to miss being enumerated at all. You will have to take extra care with households which have visitors or those in which some of the usual members are away.

Persons staying the night away from their household but not in another household, for instance, somewhere in the open air (fishing or hunting) on night duty, (policemen, nurses, engineers at the power station) should be enumerated as if present in their usual households.

Persons staying overnight in another household, for instance, a woman visiting her sister on another island, a business man staying in a hotel, should not be considered as present in their own household. They are to be enumerated where they actually spend the night.
It is essential that all possible precautions be taken to ensure that every person is counted and every person is counted only once.

## Difficulty in undertaking enumeration

Enumerators are responsible for seeking out and enumerating all households however in some cases there will be some difficulty in enumerating some households due to members not being available when the enumerator visits.

- If after three visits, it has still been impossible to enumerate the household members, make a note of the place and notify the supervisor.
- The supervisor will then make a last effort to collect whatever census information is available about the absent household members from family members or friends living nearby, neighbors or other proxy respondents. It should be stressed that this is the very last resort and that this approach is far from ideal. To start with, Area Managers should try to establish whether the absent household members may possibly be enumerated somewhere else in Solomon Islands. Household members may be away on a holiday somewhere else in the country, visiting relatives in Solomon Islands, being away to participate in a cultural event etc. There are many possible reasons for their absence. If it can be established that the above is the case, they will be covered at the place where they stayed on census night and the supervisor does not need to do anything at all.
However, if the above is not the case, supervisors should try to collect whatever information they can from these proxy respondents. In doing this, they should keep in mind that the last thing the SISO needs is an official complaint made at a later stage by absent household members about getting information about them in what they may consider in an underhand way. Unfortunately, the relationship between family members and particularly neighbors is not always a good one and providing information about others without their knowledge may sometimes create animosity. Area Managers and Census Supervisors should always proceed with the utmost tact and the moment they feel that this approach may cause trouble; they should immediately abandon it.


## Unoccupied dwellings

Permanent dwelling structures, such as houses and flats, that are capable of being lived in but are not occupied on Census night are included in the Census as 'unoccupied' private dwellings. This includes unoccupied, vacant houses or apartments to let.

## The homeless

There is one group of persons who pose particular problems during a census. These are persons who do not have a conventional roof over their heads; in other words, they do not have a fixed address and they can usually not be linked to any household. In Solomon Islands, some urban EA area have a number of vagrants, persons sleeping in the streets, or near the public dump site under some make-shift cardboard 'houses'. This clearly is a borderline category. As long as their families consider them as part of the household, they will probably visit and stay with this household in a more or less regular basis. In that case, their household will most likely include them as household members. The real problematic persons from the point of a view of a census are those whom their family does not recognize (anymore) as household members. Unless enumerators make special arrangements for the enumeration of these people, it is likely that they will be left out.
Once again, enumerators should liaise closely with their Area Manager and Census Supervisor concerning the enumeration of these people. In order to identify accommodation likely to cater for these homeless people, Area Managers should contact city/town councils and other local authorities. In Solomon Islands, some churches also play a major role in catering for the homeless. In the case of Honiara, the places where many of the homeless sleep have in the meantime been identified.

## 8. GEOGRAPHY \& ENUMERATION AREA BOUNDARIES (EA)

An EA is the area assigned to each enumerator for the purposes of census enumeration. Eas are self contained geographical areas which do not overlap.
To assure the complete coverage of population, it is essential to divide the whole country into small enumeration areas (EAs) and each census enumerator is to survey his or her assigned enumeration area to count all the population found at the time of the census. Enumeration areas (EAs) cover all the villages and the communities in the whole country.. Therefore, it is very important to properly delineate enumeration areas in each village to avoid any duplication and omission.

You will be supplied a map on which the boundaries of your EA are clearly marked. It is likely that you will find at least one village in one EA. Walk around and through your EA with the map to make sure that you know where the boundaries are and where each household within your EA is located. You will also be trained on how to read maps and it is very important that you know how to read the maps in order to manoeuvre in the field.

## Ward

The Solomon Islands is divided up into 10 provinces and smaller administrative geography (50 Electoral Boundaries and over 180 wards)

In Solomon Islands a ward is a subdivision within an Electoral Boundary used in local politics. Wards are usually named after village communities or landmarks, geographical features and in some cases historical figures connected to the area. All EA Maps include an EA number and Ward Name to make it easier to locate the EA for example in the map below the EA 50101 is located in the ward East te Nganno


In all EAs the EA (brown/purple) boundary is outlined in a large marked line on each EA map.
Roads, rivers, waterways and other physically identifiable objects have been used as a part of EA boundaries, whenever possible. If EA boundaries have to be drawn in open fields, forest or water areas where no physically identifiable objects can be found, any households that might be located near the boundary should be written down in the village map, so that there will be no confusions later on regarding the EA in which these households should be counted.

You should thoroughly familarise yourself with the boundaries of your EA and maps provided.
It is essential that you know where the boundaries of your EA are on the ground, and where these boundaries meet any other neighbouring EAs. All areas must be completely covered so that no Households are left out and so no Household appears in two EAs and is counted twice. Get together with your Supervisor and the Enumerators doing EAs adjacent to yours and ensure that each knows the common boundaries. Be especially careful that Households in thinly populated or inaccessible areas are actually included in your count. Each Household will also have its own number and this should be written on the questionnaires.


Check that you can easily identify and follow your EA boundaries.
Check for less obvious dwellings or any new buildings or new roads or changes to existing ones that may have appeared.
Make corrections if necessary on your map so that you are aware of any changes.
Try to identify any potential difficulties you might have with the Enumeration work and remember to contact your Area Manager if there is anything you are unsure about.

## Map updates

Although every effort is made to provide you with up-to-date maps, it must be remembered that there are significant limitations on accuracy, such as:

- Enumeration Area (EA) maps are completed at sometimes several months or a year before the Census, to allow for their printing, collation and distribution.
- The mapping work is sometimes reliant on updates from outside organisations, such as government agencies and planners, supplying them with timely information. For example Satellite Imagery is sometimes outdated and will not show recent development in an area.

We therefore rely on your local knowledge and your workload review to bring the maps up to date. Any updates you can add to your map will be passed on to the Solomon Islands Statistics Office after the Census.

The number of your EA will be shown on your map. This number must appear on each Questionnaire that you complete, otherwise it is impossible to put the questionnaire into its proper area for use in the reports and tabulations provided to users of the Census data.

## Dwellings that are difficult to find

Not all dwellings are easy to find. Be alert and, if necessary, make inquiries to make sure no dwellings in your workload are overlooked. For example:

- Inquire at shops and churches that might have private dwellings and/or caretakers' residences attached.
- Look out for dwellings located behind those dwellings fronting the street or track.

Sometimes the entrance of the second dwelling can be accessed by public paths or tracks around the side or back of the block, rather than from the street.

- Look out for additional dwellings within dwellings. Additional dwellings are often difficult to find because, from the street, the building may appear to be a single dwelling. During enumeration, you should ask every householder whether there is another dwelling within or on their property.


## Planning your route

To make sure that each Household in your Enumeration Area (EA) is counted you must plan a logical route or work plan. Most EA boundaries have been designed by boundaries such as physical features such as rivers, creeks, roads and tracks and paths, It is essential to plan your route and divide your work so to ensure that no dwellings are missed.

Look at your map and identify a good starting point of the EA such as a street corner or edge of a path. Draw an arrow around the EA in an anti clockwise direction. This will be the route that you follow around each EA. When visiting each dwelling you should try to keep the dwelling on your left side so that you do not miss a dwelling when following your planned route (when going anti clockwise around the EA area).

## 9. HOUSEHOLD LISTING

You will be provided with a listing of all the households in your Enumeration Area. This information was gathered from a Listings Enumeration carried out earlier this year throughout all of the Provinces. You may find some changes where new houses have since been built or houses demolished, or where families have moved. In this case, you might find that the Head of Household differs to that shown on the Listing. A copy of a Household Listing is shown below. Information on the Listing includes :

- Province and Ward codes
- Enumeration Area codes
- Household number
- Head of Household name
- GPS Code/Sticker number
- Number of people in the household
- Comments box

You have to put this information on the Questionnaire for the household you are about to visit. If there is a Sticker on the door of the house, the number should be the same as that you have on your list. Write this on the Questionnaire. If there is no Sticker, then you will have to get the number from the Listing and/or your map (assuming the Sticker has
been removed or taken off). If it is a new house or one that has been missed in the earlier Enumeration, then you will have to get a new Sticker from your Supervisor and put that on the door. You will also have to write the details at the end of your Listing and mark it on the map.
In some cases we found two families in a household when doing the Listings and so we put two Stickers on the door. Remember the criterion for separate families in a household is if they cook their meals separately as two families.
If you find there are now two families in the household where there was only one in the Listing, you will have to get a new Sticker from your Supervisor and list the second family at the end of your Listing. You should cross reference this in the Comments column so the Mapping staff can use the same GPS coordinates. Mark the new number on the map also.
Every household on the Listing should be accounted for with a Census Questionnaire. If you find that a family is away on Census Day or the house is vacant, then write that down in the Comments column. On completion of your work, the Listing with all it's amendments will be given to the computer team so they can update their Listings file.

## 10. INITIAL PREPARATIONS

The census is designed to have a familiarization visit. This is an informal preliminary visit by the enumerators anytime after the training to check if he/she exactly knows his/her boundaries and the location of all those households that he/she should and should not be counted. If the enumerator is unsure of his or her boundaries then immediate contact must be made to their Supervisor for clarifications.
On the first day of the enumeration, the enumerators need to update his/her household's lists by filling the Household listing form with the name of the head of household.

Starting on November $9^{\text {th }}$, make up your plan of action for the first visit, in which the Pre-listing of Households will be completed, by distributing the total area of your EA into daily workloads. In addition, time schedule should be made possible during this first visit by setting up times that the household decides that best suits them to be present at home for enumeration. Your program should allow for the possibility that you may encounter bad weather or other delays. The final date of the enumeration, the day on which all questionnaires must be completed and handed in to your Supervisor, must be adhered to.

In special instances, where households are very isolated, as on remote islands for instance, it will be possible to get permission from your Supervisor to make only one visit and complete all the questionnaires at one time. In these instances you must be quite sure that your enumeration is as close to the situation as it will be on the Census Date as possible.

As you do your enumeration, please try to keep your questionnaires in good order. It is sometimes impossible to keep paper clean and completely dry, but remember that others have to process and read your work so that the sheets must be kept legible. It is important to note that paper absorbs dirt and moisture. Since we are scanning the questionniares, it is very important to keep them free from dirt and moisture since dirt and moisture may make it impossible to read the information accurately from the questionnaires. If you accidentally spoil a questionnaire, put a heavy diagonal line across it, corner to corner, and begin another.
Because of confidentiality, the cancelled ones should all come in with the others; do not throw them away. All the questionnaires you are issued must come back to your Supervisor, completed, unused or spoilt. Make reference to the spoilt questionnaire in your notebook.

You should also carry your Certificate of Authority and Appointment as Census Enumerator and your ID badge. These should be shown to the persons you interview when you introduce yourself and before you begin the enumeration.

Usually Census Enumerators are appointed to communities which they know well and in which they are well known. This has great benefits for the accuracy and completeness of the enumeration and, usually, the friendly atmosphere in which it is conducted. Occasionally though, past history may make your dealings with an individual or family difficult or
embarrassing, to you and/or to them. If you have a case like this, inform your Supervisor so that he/she can make arrangements for someone else to do this Household.

Remember that your duties as an Enumerator are not complete until your Supervisor is satisfied with your work. If your questionnaires are not complete your Supervisor will require you to complete them before certifying your work. You cannot be paid until your work has been certified by the Supervisor. If questions are not all filled in you will be required to go back to the uncompleted households and get the information. The Government Statistician will retain the authority to require you to complete or redo questionnaires about which questions or doubts occur during later processing.

## 11. RELATIONS WITH THE PUBLIC

It is important for the census that it be conducted in a professional, efficient and friendly atmosphere; the following are some suggestions on how to keep it that way.

There will be extensive public communications program in place prior to census day, there should be no doubt in the minds of your respondents about your right to ask the questions specified in the census questionnaires. You should show your Certificate of Appointment and Authority to all respondents. Note that respondents have the right to see their questionnaires (uncompleted) to make sure that the questions you ask are relevant to the census.

## Please be considerate of your respondents' rights, privacy and feelings.

On the first, introductory visit let your respondents know when it is likely you will make your second visit for the actual enumeration, and try to abide by the time you tell them. However, you should be firm about interviewing the Head of the Household and other responsible adults individually. You will notice that at the end of the personal questionnaire you are to note whether the person replying to your questions is the same one as is named on the questionnaire. It will not always be possible to question directly all people (for example if they are out on a fishing trip) and, in some cases, such as children, not at all desirable, but plans are to obtain a get a high proportion of adults, particularly women, answering questions for their own questionnaire. First-hand information is usually more accurate than hearsay or second hand information although the latter is much better than nothing. This applies particularly to adult females who are likely to have much more accurate information about their own children's' date of birth, and other fertility information related to them, than anyone else. You should be very careful to remind mothers to remember all their children, particularly the youngest and, of these, particularly the girls. If a female has had a child prior to the current relationship, this child needs to be counted as well.
Note that it is most important that the head of the household is someone enumerated on the Household questionnaire. If the 'usual' head of the household (for the example the father of children in the household) is somewhere else - away on a trip to the City, visiting relatives, in hospital, staying in a work camp - where they should be enumerated on Census night some other adult in the household must be nominated as the head of the Household.

## 12. CONDUCTING THE INTERVIEW

Your success in collecting census information depends on knowing what to do in each household and doing it quickly and efficiently. Some guidelines for interviewing are:-

- Confine your interviews to the responsible members of the household. The Head of the Household must be interviewed and adult females should also be interviewed if possible. Do not interview children, servants or neighbours of a household about its members except to find out the best time to call back if no responsible member has been available on the first two visits.
- Never permit the person you are interviewing to examine a questionnaire filled out for another Household. Keep such papers well out of sight to avoid such possibilities arising.
- Do not express surprise or disapproval, including by the way you look or by the tone of your voice, at any answers you may get to the census questions, Your job is to record the facts, as they are reported by the respondents.
- Do not reveal your opinion of the census questions to respondents. The respondent should feel that these are serious matters and that their answers are important. Ask the census questions as if you are confident that you will receive an answer.
- Ask the questions exactly as they are worded on the questionnaire and exactly in order in which they appear. Observe the skip patterns carefully (eg. Questions P21 and P22) and note where some questions apply only to persons of a certain age or to women only.
- Maintain a friendly manner. Avoid getting into argument or controversial discussion. Do not discuss controversial or political events. Remember you have a lot of work to do, it must be done well and many people must be interviewed in the time available.


## 13. COMMUNICATIONS IN THE FIELD

It is important that you manage your communications effectively when you are working in the field. To assist you with this, the Solomon Islands Statistics Office is intending to equip Area Managers with a communications system based on the use of SMS or voicemail messaging.

If a household has a query about any aspect of the Census they can call the Census Office on Ph. 22154. Any messages received from the public regarding complaints and help inquiries will be managed by the Census District Superintendent in each Province and Area Manager.

## 14. THE CENSUS QUESTIONNAIRE

The Solomon Islands Population and Housing Census Questionnaire is printed on A3 double-sided paper. These questionnaires are specially designed for scanning so please take notice of the instructions below.
Intelligent character recognition (ICR) is used in data processing to scan images of the Census questionnaires to produce data files. The scanner detects and processes all marks and writing on the questionnaire.

The questionnaire is laid out as follows:
Geographic identifiers
Enumerator ID


## HOW TO FILL IN THE QUESTIONNAIRE:

Only use a black pen. Do not use other pens or pencils. This is because the questionnaire will be scanned therefore the scanner reads the black ink better. Do not use correction fluid or similar products on any questionnaires.

It is important to be sure or to fully understand the response before writing down on the questionnaire. Please take your time and do not rush. Position your clipboard properly so that you can write properly.

Start the questionnaire by filling all the persons names in the household who are present on census night before asking the other questions. In this way you can get the idea of the how many persons and then referring to their names when asking the questions.

Interview adults only. Information for children MUST be collected from an adult. If no adults are present during the visit, arrange to come back to the household later when the adults are around.

## For text boxes:

It is essential that you write in, CAPITAL LETTERS - leaving clear spaces between the letters . Remember when entering information into text or numerical boxes, each letter or digit must be within the box provided as these are easiest for the ICR scanning machines to read.

Only mark boxes with an "X", drawing the lines diagonally across the box from corner to corner.

Use the codes and name found at the end of this document (annex) to fill in the above
Province: This is the province code: 2 digits
Ward: This is the Ward code: 2 digits - from your map
Village: Write down the village name. A village is usually defined as a group of dwellings who usually do things together, have one village head such as a village chief and have a common place such as church where the people usually meet and do other things in a communal manner. It may not have distinct or physical boundaries. Just a caution that there are places within the village that do have names but do not meet the above criteria. You do not need to fill in the boxes next to the name. This will be used for office use only. There are however places with names within the village. In this case DO NOT put place names. We only require village names.
$\boldsymbol{E A}$ : Enumeration Areas or EAs are smallest geographic "building blocks" used in the Census. This is the Enumeration Area number that you have been assigned. During this census, new Enumeration areas have been re-drawned and assigned a five digit number. You will be notified of the one will be assigned if is has 5 digits.
$\boldsymbol{H H}$ : This is the household number. You MUST use the household number that is given to you on the household listing because it matches up with a Head of Household name. Household numbers have three digits which start at 001.

## Sticker:

Either the sticker number for the household as given to you on your household listing. This should be the sticker number on the door. If this is a new house that is not on your household listing and there is no sticker on the door, you will need to get a sticker from your Supervisor. You will also have to mark the house and sticker number on your map.


## Enumerator ID:

Each enumerator will be assigned a 4-digit identification number. This number will be labelled on your Identity card alongside your name.

## Large households

Questionnaires are designed to cover up to six people in a household. If there are more than six people in the household, you must continue with an extra Questionnaire for the additional persons. This questionnaire must have the same Household Number and Sticker.

Fill in the $\square$ at the top of the first page and at the top of the second. If there are 2 questionnaires used you will enter 1 of 2 and on the second questionnaire 2 of 2 . Change the person number on the second and subsequent pages. The first person on the second page will usually number ' 7 ', the second person ' 8 ' and so on.
The reason for entering the names of household members in this prescribed order is that it will give the enumerator a clear picture of the composition of the household right from the start of the interview. Emphasize that names are not stored in the database however it is needed only for identification and monitoring during the enumeration phase.
The enumerator should specifically enquire about some categories of persons that are often missed out during a census:
Babies: This applies in particular to babies who have not yet been given a name. Make sure that all babies and young children are included. If the infant has no name, write "Baby of person ---" and enter the mother's person number. Old women: In Melanesian culture, the first person you meet is often the man and the women are often out of sight either at the back of the room, inside the house or out looking for firewood. They would be easily missed if proper questions were not asked for such instances.
Nightshift workers: Persons, who normally sleep with the household, but, do not stay with the household or any other household at census night since they are working during that night but will return home during the next morning. This includes police officers, nurses and other health personnel, security guards, prison guards etc. on a nightshift. It also includes fishermen who were out fishing on census night as well as persons staying at the market on census night in order to make an early start the next morning. According to the coverage rules, all these persons should be enumerated with their own household if they returned to their household after finishing their night shift or their fishing trip.

Enumerators should not proceed to the next question unless they are completely satisfied that the household listing is complete and correct.

## 15. PERSON QUESTIONS

Note that the questions are designed in sequential manner therefore should be asked starting at P1 and proceed accordingly. Look for 'skips' of 'Go to' reference if the responses meet certain criteria. This is to ensure flow within the questions and act as a guide to avoid questions that may not be applicable to that respondent. There are questions that apply only for certain groupings such as sex, age, and some have certain reference period that will require respondent to recall from memory.
IN ALL CASES WHERE THE QUESTIONS ARE APPLICABLE, ALL QUESTIONS MUST BE ANSWERED AND RECORDED ACCORDINGLY

## P1. WHAT IS THIS PERSON'S NAME?



This question applies to all members of the household including babies and visitors sleeping in this household.
The purpose of this question is to list all household members living in the household and including visitors sleeping in the house during the census night even if they are only visiting. A de facto census refers to counting all people staying in the household during the census night including visitors.
Record the first names and last names of all household members living in the household in the space provided. Start with the head of household as person number 1 and then followed by other members of the household and make written entries using one column for each person. First name in this case is should be the Christian name in most cases while last name usually refers to surname or family name. In Solomon Islands's case this will mostly be traditional names.
The name is needed to ensure that everyone in the household is covered and to assist the household head responding to the interview that the correct personal information for each individual is recorded. The name also helps identify where questionnaires are missing or duplicated.
At the start of the census interview of a particular household, the enumerator must list the names of all persons who stayed in the household on census night. These names are recorded in P1. However, there may be a few exceptions to this rule. On census night, some household members may be on a nightshift or out fishing but return the next morning. These persons will be enumerated with their own household and should therefore be included in the list of household members in P1. However, enumerators are again reminded that probably more than 95 percent of all persons who were on census night in Solomon Islands will be staying with their own household on census night.

Question: Pl: "What is this person's name? List all who stayed in this household on census night."

## Instructions:

The enumerator should start with establishing the identity of the head of the household or the person who is in charge of the household. The question that he/she should ask is:

## "Who is the head of this household?

It is important that enumerators realize that the head of the household can be a man or a woman. The head of the household is the person who is regarded by its members as the head. In many cases, the head of household will not be present during the census interview. In these cases, the enumerator should ask for the person who, in the absence of the head of the household, is in charge of the household. If this person is also absent, they should ask for the most senior member of the household who is present.

After entering the name of the head of household in the first column (for person number 1), the enumerator needs to explain that he/she must record particulars of everyone who was present in the household on census night. It is important that the names of the household members are listed in a prescribed order. This order is:

Head of household and his/her spouse and unmarried children, beginning with the eldest and ending with the youngest.
Married children (if they stayed in the household on census night!) and their spouses and children
Children of unmarried children (of the head of household) who stay with their grandparents.
Other relatives and their spouses and children (if staying in the household on census night!)
Those (staying in the household on census night) who are not related to the head or anyone else in the household.
The reason for entering the names of household members in this prescribed order is that it will give the enumerator a clear picture of the composition of the household right from the start of the interview. It will also facilitate quality control by the Area Manager.
If a respondent is reluctant to give his/her name (i.e. for reasons of confidentiality), explain that there are two reasons why the name of respondents is entered on the interview schedule

1) Politeness: During the interview, the enumerator should be able to address respondents by name and not refer to a number.
2) Use of the results: It needs to he stressed again, that the answers to question Pl (which refers to the names of all persons staying in the household at census night), is only for identification purposes. In case of missing data or discrepancies/inconsistencies in the data recorded on the interview schedule, these errors must be corrected while the interview schedules are still in the field.

## "Was there anyone else staying in this household on census night?"

The enumerator should specifically enquire about some categories of persons that are often missed out during a census:
Babies: This applies in particular to babies who have not yet been given a name. Make sure that all babies and young children are included. If the infant has no name, write "Baby of---" and enter the mother's person number.

Nightshift workers: Persons, who normally sleep with the household, but do not stay with the household or any other household at census night since they are working during that night but will return home during the next morning. This includes police officers, nurses and other health personnel, security guards, prison guards etc. on a nightshift. It also includes fishermen who were out fishing on census night as well as persons staying at the market on census night in order to make an early start the next morning. According to the coverage rules, all these persons should be enumerated with their own household if they returned to their household after finishing their night shift or their fishing trip.

## Enumerators should not proceed to the next question unless they are completely satisfied that the household listing is complete and correct.

## P2. what is the person's relationship to head of household?

P2. What is the person's relationship to head of household?

applies to all members of the household.
Question P2, provides information about the composition of each household. This is important for demographic analysis therefore as an enumerator make certain that each person in the household provide their relationship to the head of household only.
Relationships between members of extended household in the South Pacific Region, including Solomon Islands are not always straightforward, particular for outsiders. For instance the relationship "cousin" and "auntie" is much more widely used than in most parts of the world. As a result, enumerators are sometimes not able to record the relationship correctly. It is important to make this distinction. In case of doubt, it is the task of the enumerator to establish the real relationship. However, in doing this, enumerators should be aware that this may be a sensitive issue for some parents.

Question P2: "What is this person's relationship to the head of household?
Instructions:
Enumerators should enter one of the relationships provided below in the space provided on the questionnaire. These precoded relationships are:

Spouse (of HoH)
Son/Daughter (of HoH)
4 Adopted Son/Adopted Daughter (of HoH)
5 Son in Law/Daughter in Law (of HoH)
Grandchild (of HoH)

8 Brother/Sister/Brother in Law/Sister in Law (of HoH)
9 Other Relative ( of HoH )
10 Not Related (to HoH )
People living in Intuitions are usually not related to the Head of HouseholdIn case of the usual head of household absent on the census night, the spouse or the most senior person in the household automatically becomes the head of household. The usual practice is that enumerators complete question 1 and 2 at the same time. In other words, when he/she enters the names of the household members (Question P1) in the prescribed order; he/she completes (Question P2), the relationship of each person to the head of household at the same time.
Enumerators should be careful to distinguish between natural children (that is children born to the parents) and adopted or step children. This is particularly important when census information is used for the indirect analysis of fertility and mortality, as is the case in Solomon Islands. The difference in age between a biological/natural mother and her child is seldom less than 15 .

## P3. what is the person's sex?

This question applies to all members of the household. Note that you will only record one response for this question
Question P3 asks the sex of each person in the household. This question is needed to provide information on population structure and differences by sex. It is important to record the answer correctly.

## Instruction:

The two answers to this question have been pre-coded on the Questionnaire:

1. Male
2. Female

Enumerators need to mark the appropriate box.
Most enumerators will, whenever this is possible, enter the sex of respondents from observation. However, it needs to be stressed again that, in most cases, the majority of the household members will not be present during the interview, since they are at work, at school etc. The head of household, his/her spouse or a senior member of the household who is present, will provide all census information for the absent household members, including their sex. In these cases, the enumerator needs to ask.
Check whether the sex of respondents that has been recorded is compatible with the name ( Pl ) and relationship ( P 2 ) of these respondents. In reality, many enumerators do not ask for the sex of absent household members since they assume that this is clear from their name, relationship and physical appearance. This may sometimes lead to errors based on physical appearance alone; it is particularly easy to get the sex of babies and young infants wrong. If the enumerator is not sure, double-check with the father or mother of the child, or the respondent who answers the questions for this child. The enumerator needs to enter the sex of all members of the household. Area Managers should make sure that the sex of all respondents has been entered before the Census Questionnaire leaves the field. Cases of unstated sex will not be allowed in the census tabulations.

# p4. What is the person's date of birth and age at last BIRTHDAY? 

P4. What is the person's date of birrh and age at last birthday? (in completed years)


This question applies to all members of the household.
Age and sex are used to determine the structure of the population, and to estimate fertility and mortality levels and age-dependency ratios, and to project future population size. In order to obtain accuracy data on these indicators, enumerators should ensure that date of birth and ages are recorded correctly.

## Instructions:

Enter day, month and year of birth in the boxes provided: dd $/ \mathrm{mm} / \mathrm{yyyy}$.
Note: In this particular case, enumerators should enter the information directly into the code box included on the questionnaire.
If the exact date of birth of a respondent is unknown, enter the year of birth. In that case, the number 00 should be entered for the day and month of birth. In cases where Year of birth is unknown, try and make certain reference to significant historical events as a guide to estimating year of birth - e.g. Independence Day, WW2, cyclone, tsunami,earthquake, riots and demonstrations etc. Yet if the year of birth is unknown, the age should be entered instead. However most age will be less than 100 years old therefore a 0 (or 00 ) maybe added to the age. For example if the age is 9 , you would write in the age as 009 . If you establish the year of birth, also enquire about the age even though you may already calculate it. This is a way of checking the date of birth. Enumerators should be clear enough that the age required is the complete age, referring to the respondent's age at their last birth date. For example, if John's birth date is on the October 15, 1974, then his age should be recorded as 35 at the time of the census (November 22, 2009). Children under 1 year of age should be recorded as zero ( 0 age).

In those cases where the respondent does not know his/her date of' birth, the enumerator needs to estimate the year of birth. In doing this, he/she should make use of all estimation techniques that are available. Some of these include:
Family and household relationships. If the date of birth of at least one household member is known to be accurate, the relationship of this person with other household members may help to estimate a reasonably accurate year of birth of' these other household members.

If all else fails, the enumerator should make the best estimate he/she can make, judging by things like the physical appearance of respondents and by using common sense. It is important to remember that an age estimated by an enumerator will in virtually all cases be superior to an age imputed by a computer.

Some people may' not know their date of birth but may have some idea about their age. If that is the case: Ask: "How old is this person?"
Note: If the age is known, calculate the year of birth and enter the year of birth (in four digits).
All census staff is reminded that, from the point of view of data quality, accurate date of birth (age) reporting (and recording) is probably the most essential requirement in a census. This is not only important in its own right. Failing to do so also results in a very significant reduction in the overall quality of census data, since virtually all this data is age-specific.

P5. Is the person's biological mother still alive? If "N" GO TO P7 
```

This question applies to all members of the household.
In the absence of a complete vital registration system (recording of births and deaths), information collected on the status of the person's biological mother and father enables the application of the own children method for deriving fertility estimates for a 10 or 15 year periods. The question is also important to determine the proportion of the population, especially the proportion of children living without their real mothers. All household members are required to provide an answer for this question.

The biological mother is also referred to as the real, natural or own mother .

## Instructions:

- There are three possible answers to P5

1. YES (still alive) (Y)
2. NO (Dead) (N)
3. Don't Know(DK)

Enumerators need to enter option 1 or 2 and in exceptional cases when the respondent does not know the vital status of his/her mother, option 3 (Don't know). The latter will sometimes be the case, particularly in single parent families. If the answer is 3 then skip to P7.

## P6. IS SHE LIVING IN THIS HOUSEHOLD?



## This question applies to all members of the household.

If the biological mother is still alive, there are two possibilities: either this mother is staying in the same household as the respondent or the mother is not staying in the same household as the respondent.

## Instructions:

The respondent and his/her mother are staying in the same household: In this case the enumerator should mark. 1. $Y$ box and then enter in the space provided, the person number of this biological mother as given in the row of P1.

If the respondent and his/her mother are not staying in the same household: In this case the enumerator should mark the $2 . \mathrm{N}$ box provided. Then proceed to the next question.

## P7. is the person's biological father still Alive?

The biological father is also referred to as the real, natural or own father.

## Instructions:

There are three possible answers to P7

1. YES (still alive) (Y)
2. NO (Dead) (N)
3. Don't Know(DK)

Enumerators need to enter option 1 or 2 and in exceptional cases when the respondent does not know the vital status of his father, option 3 (Don't know). The latter will sometimes be the case, particularly in single parent families where the father is unknown or no longer living with the mother of the child.

## P8. WHAT IS THIS PERSON'S ETHNIC ORIGIN?



This question applies to all members of the household. Only one box should be marked.
Information collected on ethnicity is most important for policy makers and planners to identify ethnic groups in the country that are most disadvantaged. Ethnicity also identifies and distinguishes people with common cultural, linguistic, religious and behaviours.

## Instructions:

Enumerators should mark one of the ethnicity categories given at the inside of the front cover of the interview schedule book. Please enter the name of the person's ethnic origin in the space provided if not among the categories.
It will be noted that in most households, all household members belong to the same ethnic group. Record the ethnic group to which respondents consider themselves to belong to or identify with. Note that this question does not ask about nationality or citizenship. If there is any doubt as to a respondent's ethnicity, ask for the ethnicity of the father.
In many countries in the South Pacific, including Solomon Islands, accurate recording of ethnicity has become increasingly more difficult over time due to intermarriage etc. Reality in the 21st century is that the ethnicity of many respondents is mixed. It needs to be reiterated that with regards to the question of ethnicity in a census, respondents are what they say they are.

## P9. What is this person's citizenship?

question applies to all members of the household. Only one box should be marked.
It is important to record the citizenship of each respondent, since citizens and non-citizens have different entitlements in any country or territory. Governments need to know the number of citizens and the number of noncitizens, as well as total population numbers. Non-citizens are not usually permitted to stay indefinitely and often have very different characteristics from the citizen population.

## Instructions:

Enumerators need to mark the appropriate box, 1. for Solomon Islanders by birth; 2. for Solomon Islanders by naturalization and enter the name of other countries for option 3.

The question is about citizenship NOT residency status in Solomon Islands. Solomon Islands by naturalization applies to those who have been granted citizenship in Solomon Islands although they were citizens of elsewhere prior to that. In cases of dual citizenship, mark 2. Solomon Islands by Naturalization as he/she currently resides here. For category 3, please write the name of the country in the space provided.

## P10. WHAT IS THE PERSON'S MARITAL STATUS?

This question applies to all member of the household. Only one box should be marked.
The concept "marriage" is far from straightforward. Three different types of marriages are usually known in Solomon Islands and these are Traditional/Customary marriage, Religious/Church marriage and Municipal/Government marriage. A consensual/defacto union is defined as cohabitation by an unmarried couple for an extended period of time. It is a socially accepted union where the two partners live together as husband and wife but have not been through any civil or religious ceremony. In other words, they are not legally married. This is despite couples having children in that living arrangement. If they mention that they are married and if they say 'yes' you should then proceed with the type of marriage arrangements they have.
For the census purpose, customary arrangements are classified as de facto relationship.

## Instructions:

Enumerators should enter one of the six marital status categories given at the inside of the front cover of the interview schedule book, These pre-coded categories are:
1 Never Married
2 Married (includes legal and illegal arrangement)
3 Custom (includes de facto relationship)
4 Divorced
5 Separated but Legally Married (not divorced)
6 Widowed
As already mentioned the discussion concerning relationship, for some people, discussing the precise nature of their marital status may be a sensitive issue. Enumerators are therefore instructed to accept and record the answers that are given by respondents, even in cases where they suspect that these answers may not be correct.

## P11. WHAT IS THIS PERSON'S RELIGION?



This question applies to all members of the household. Only one box should be marked. If 'other', specify.
Religion is an indicator of lifestyle and community of affiliation. It is often associated with particular attitudes, which can have demographic and economic importance, such as acceptance or rejection of family planning, and education and employment for women. It is therefore important to record the right religion the respondent states that he/she belongs to. Note that in the above coding, Christian church denominations are listed instead of religions. Christianity is a religion while affiliated churches names above are Christian church denominations. This is deliberate to ensure not to differentiate any religion for sensitivity purposes. If the respondents answered to this question as Christianity, ask $\mathrm{him} /$ her to specify the name of church denomination. If the name provided is not on the list, you must write the name of the religion or church on the space provided. Other religions include Islam/Muslims, Hindu, Buddhist, Mormon (Latter Day Saints), Jehovah witness and many more.

## Instructions:

Enumerators should start with establishing the religion of the head of household. After the appropriate answer has been entered, they are allowed to ask the follow-up question: "Are all members of the household of the same religion?" Make sure to mark different religion for members of the household having different religion with the head of the household. Write the name of the religion for category 13 in the space provided.

## P12. Where IS this persons's place of Birth?

This question applies to all members of the household. Only one box should be marked. If 'other' refers to elsewhere in the country, specify province and ward codes in the boxes provided. Or if 'other country', specify country code in the box provided.
Place of birth ( P 12 ) is used in conjunction with place of residence ( P 13 ) and place of residence in the last 6 years (15) to provide information about movement within any country, and about immigration. Place of birth is not necessarily related to citizenship, so it is important to ask a specific question about place of birth.

Note that the place of birth referred to here is usually the mother's place of residence when she gave birth. If the person's mother was born in Choiseul but living in Honiara when the birth happened Honiara is the person's place when he/she was born. If the mother was born in Choiseul but gave birth to baby in Honiara hospital, then the place of birth is recorded as Choiseul. It does not necessarily mean hospital or medical facility where the actual birth took place. If they were born elsewhere in Solomon Islands or abroad, write down the name of province/ward or country. Again this should be checked to ensure that his/her mother does not go to that place for delivery but actually lived there.

## Instructions:

There are 2 pre-coded answers for place of birth as given in the interview schedule:
1.Same ward
2.Other

Mark box 1 for the person born in the same ward and mark box 2 for the person who was born in the different ward, province, elsewhere in the country or in other country. Then enter the code in the boxes provided.
If only the Province is known code 00 in the Ward.

## P13. WHAT IS this persons's usual place of residence?



This question applies to all members of the household. Only one box should be marked. If 'other' refers to elsewhere in the country, specify province and ward codes in the boxes provided. Or if 'other country', specify country code in the box provided.
For Solomon Census 2009, a respondent's usual place of residence is the place where he/she usually lives at the time of the census, or intends to live for a total of six months or more in 2009.

## Instructions:

There are 2 pre-coded answers for the person's usual place as given in the interview schedule:
1.Same ward
2.Other

Mark box 1 for the person who resides in the same ward as shown at the top of the questionnaire and mark box 2 for the person who resides in a different ward, province, elsewhere in Solomon or in another country outside Solomon. Then enter the code in the boxes provided.

## P14. QUESTIONS ABOUT DIFFICULTIES THE PERSON MAY HAVE



This question applies to all members and can have more than one box marked but only 1 for each type of difficulty. The above questions must be asked in all cases. Just because the person does not look to have any health problems, it MUST NOT be assumed that they do not. The questions should be asked for each type of difficulty. Note that there may be combination of difficulties. If the respondent indicates that he/she does have a problem, ask about the extent of difficulty. It may be difficult to determine these for newborns in which case, mark all NDs. Also disability here refers to permanent disability and not temporary. E.g if someone has a broken leg, he/she may have a chance to have it recovered in a few months time and this is not considered a permanent disability unless of course, it is really serious.
Instructions:
Mark box a. 1 when the person states that she/he has no difficulty at all in seeing even when wearing glasses. Similarly, if the person states that she/he has some difficulties in hearing then mark box b.2. However the person can have some difficulties in hearing, seeing and walking so make certain to mark the appropriate box accordingly, in this case it should be a.2, b.2, and c.2.

## P15. WHERE was the Person's residence WHEN RAMSI FIRST ARRIVED?

This question applies to members of the household that have at least 5 years of age. Only one box should be marked. If 'other' refers to elsewhere in the country, specify province and ward codes in the boxes provided. Or if 'other country', specify country code in the box provided.
Many people in Solomon Islands have changed their usual place of residence within the country during the six years before the census. In particular, there has been a continuing move from the rural to the urban sector. It is essential for planners to have a complete and accurate picture of these relatively recent movements. In the absence of a Continuous Population Register (CPR) in the Solomon Islands, basic information concerning the movements of people needs to be provided by the census. The cross-classification of census data concerning place of birth, usual place of residence in 2004 and place of enumeration, is the only, albeit rather restricted, source of knowledge concerning nationwide internal migration as well as urbanization in the Solomon Islands.

Question P15 tries to capture recent migration and movements of people in and out of Solomon Islands. Respondents are asked their usual residence when RAMSI first arrived in Solomon to assist them in recalling their past residence.

## Instruct ions:

Enumerators are instructed to state the following for every person in the household: province and ward if in Solomon Islands (and country if outside Solomon Islands)

Mark the appropriate box for every respondent aged 5 years and over with their usual residence during that period. For example, mark box 1. for respondents staying in the same ward in the last five years. Otherwise mark box 2. for those staying elsewhere in Solomon or in another country. Then enter the codes appropriately.

## P16. Is this person now attending $A$ formal educational institution?

This question applies to all members of a household with at least 5 years of age. It is highly likely that persons over the age of 50 are not attending formal education. If 'Never been to school, or 'Left School' go to

## P17. Only 1 box should be marked

Note that this question only asks for attendance of formal educational institutions. A formally recognized educational institution is an institution recognized by the Department of Education (DOE) where education is provided on a full-time basis (i.e. a kindergarten, primary and secondary schools and institutions that offer tertiary education). Note that vocational education is not a category in this instance, therefore if the answer sounds to be of a vocational school, mark 3 'left school'.
Full time students are enrolled in an educational programme whose study load is considered full time according to Solomon Islands standards. Part time students are those whose study load is less than that of a full-time student and who consequently will require a longer period to complete an equivalent educational programme.
Children who usually attend school but did not attend at the time of the interview due to illness or for some other reason should be considered as full-time students.
Another caution is the timing of the enumeration. The actual census will be done towards the end of the school year and therefore you will need to watch out for those who may have a school break early and may not know their status the following year especially if they are in Class 6 , year 8 , year 10 , year 12 or year 13 who usually sit national examination. This is because only the examination results will determine their status and some may be tempted to say they have left school. If this interview is done after school break, ask if he/she has attended school in the last 3 months.
Since the census is done during the school year, enumerators should record those people attending school at this period of time.

## Instructions:

The interviewer should make sure that the respondent is at least 5 years of age. The head of the household can provide information for those household members not in the household or those young members. There are 4 pre coded answers provided in the interview schedule booklet:
1.Full time (for those attending formal education on a full time basis)
2. Part time (attending formal education on a part time basis)
3.Left school (those who have completed or not completed formal education)
4. Never been (for those who never attended any formal school) then skip to P17

Mark one box according to the respondent answer. For those who have left school and never been to school, mark box 3 or 4 then skip to question P18.

## P17. What is the level of education this person is currently attending?


question applies to those who responded that they are currently attending formal education either full time or part time in P16. Only 1 box should be marked. If 'other', specify in the box provided.

## Instructions:

- These questions refer to formal education.
- For respondents still attending an educational institution either full time or part time , record the standard (primary school), form (secondary school), tertiary, vocational and specify for other types of education. Examples are:
- Preschool: 88
- Primary: Standard S1,S2, S3, S4, S5, S6, S7 or S8
- Secondary: Form F1, F2, F3, F4, F5, F6,F7
- Tertiary
- Vocational
- Other (specify)
- Those who have left school $(\mathrm{P} 16=3)$ and who have never been to school $(\mathrm{P} 16=4)$, are excluded from Question P17.
- Proceed to the next question.

QUESTIONS P18-19 APPLY ONLY TO PERSONS 12 YEARS OF AGE AND OVER.

## P18. CAN THIS PERSON READ AND WRITE A SIMPLE SENTENCE?



This question applies to all members of household of at least 12 years of age. There can be more than one box marked for this question. If the person cannot read and write in a particular language then mark the 'no' box.
This question is asking whether the person can read and write in English Pidgin and/or Local Languages. It is a multi response question meaning there can be more than one answer. Note that there is no methodology of testing used but relies only on the answer provided by the respondents.
Instructions:

- For respondents who state that they can read and write in more than one language, mark the appropriate boxes accordingly. For example, if she/he can write and speak both English and local language then boxes 1 and 3 for Yes should be marked.
- For those who cannot write and read any language, mark the NO box.

This question applies to all members of the household of at least 12 year of age. Only one box should be marked. If 'other' specify in the box provided. Only 1 box should be marked.

## Instructions:

- These questions refer to formal education.
- Report only the highest level of schooling that has been successfully completed by using the codes listed on the questionnaire.
- For those who have never been to school record no school completed category. For respondents who have completed any type of education, enumerators should make certain to record the level that the respondents have completed. The enumerator should mark the correct box provided in the questionnaire.
- Sometimes enumerators confuse the terms class, form, grade etc. For primary school they should consistently use "standard" and for secondary school "form". For respondents reporting their highest level as Certificate or Diploma, there may be some confusion. Try to establish what kind of Certificate/Diploma is meant and specify that in the space provided. For instance, a respondent who attends Postgraduate Diploma courses must, in virtually all cases have completed a bachelors degree. However, one can study for many certificates and diplomas without having completed Secondary School. These people should be classified in code 8 .


## P20. During the last 12 months did this person work for money overseas?

This question applies to people aged 12 years and over only. Only 1 box should be marked.
The Pacific short-term labour migration scheme allows Solomon Islanders short term visas to work in Australia and New Zealand in order to overcome labour shortages particularly in the horticultural industry.
This question has been included to capture information on whether the person has worked for money overseas in the last 12 months.
The options for response to this question are No work for pay has been done overseas or work has been done in Australia, New Zealand or other country.
Instructions:

- Make sure the respondents is in the eligible age category (at least 12 years and over).
- There are 4 options shown in the interview schedule. For those who did not work for money overseas, mark box 1 and for those who did work for money overseas mark the appropriate box.

This question applies to people aged 12 years and over only. Only 1 box should be marked.
Work in this instance includes work for pay, work to support the household by producing goods mainly for sale or work to support the household by producing goods mainly for own consumption or any other related work that needs to be specified. Try and identify women who claim to do "housework" but also spent some time in activity such as fishing, handicraft, any form of farming activities then mark box number 1 for "Yes" then skip to P23.
The reference period here 'last week' refers to a week before the interview. The purpose of this question is to determine the size of the working force in the working age group in the country. If the person did not work, because they did housework only, were full time students, retired/too old or disabled - mark box 2 and then proceed on to P23.

## Instructions:

- P21 is a simple yes/no question and applies to all respondents aged 12 years and over. These two options are shown on the interview schedule:

This question is applied to people aged 12 years and over. Only 1 box should be marked.
This question refers to those who have had a job but did not work last week for some reason. In order to capture these people, question P22 is asked for those people who did not do any work in the last week prior to the census interview.
Instructions:

- This is a simple yes/no question, these two options are:


Go to P26

- Enumerators need to mark X on the appropriate box and if the answer is no then questions P23, P24 and P25 should not be asked.

It is important that enumerators enter the correct answer in question P22. In particular, it is very important that all those who were during the reference period (last week) temporarily absent from work because they were on leave, sick, on strike, involved in a labour dispute etc. should be included in the category "workers". They are referred to as the "inactive employed". Examples are a teacher who is on a holiday, a factory employee who is on strike etc. These persons should be regarded as having worked during the reference period. In other words, for them, the box "yes" should be ticked. If in these cases, enumerators mistakenly tick "no", these persons will not be asked questions P23-P25. However, it will immediately become clear that they have made a mistake when they ask these inactively employed persons question P27 (why they didn't actively look for work?). If that happens, they should return to question P22, mark X on "yes" and proceed asking questions P23-P25.

## P23. WHAT TYPE OF WORK/ACTIVITY DOES THIS PERSON USUALLY DO?



Only 1 box should be marked. This question applies to people aged 12 years and over and for those people who answered "Yes" in question P21.
Persons with two or more work/activity are required to report the information for the work at which they worked the most hours.

## Instructions:

The first four categories refer to work for pay (in cash or in kind) which includes wages, salary, contract, commissions or was operating a business in which some kind of income is earned. The categories are:

1. working for the government;
2. working for private companies
3. Employer
4. Self-Employed.
5. Voluntary work
6. Unpaid family work, which refers to those who spend time doing unpaid work for supporting their family. Please mark box 6 then go to P24.
7. Producing goods for sale mainly to support household. For instance work that involves farming, gardening, fishing and handicrafts mainly for sales. Please mark box 7 then skip to P25
8. The answer refers to work to support the household by producing goods mainly for consumption as in farming, gardening, fishing and handicrafts. Please mark box 8 then skip to P25.
The enumerators need to mark the correct box and follow skips instructions where applicable.
"Money work" means any activity that finally returns money to the person, household or the company. Thus, beside wages/salary or business incomes, persons growing crops, catching fish, collecting shells or other things for sale are involved in money activities. This also applies to a person who sells his services i.e. fixes things like cars or builds houses, etc. In other words, persons with money income (including the above "inactive employed" category) consist of Wage/salary earners or Self-employed (business).

## P24. What is the main activity/work done by this person at their workplace?

Question P24 applies to people aged 12 years and over.
If the person does have some form of work/activity in P22, ask to specify the activity engaged in, even if self employed. The activity here refers to the general nature of the business carried out such as manufacturing, education, transport, construction etc.

## Instructions:

Enumerators should give a precise description of the industry or type of business the respondent works for. This can be a company, firm, organization, institution or government department. If during the reference period, the respondent was temporarily away from his/her job, due to leave, illness, a labor dispute works etc. the industry he/she usually works for as his/her workplace. Once again, in order to facilitate the work of the coders, and to obtain meaningful industry statistics, enumerators should describe the government department, company, firm, organization or institution as accurately as possible. For instance, the industry of an accountant working for a motor vehicle manufacturer is "motor vehicle manufacturing".
If unsure, put the name of the company/department/organization/institution in the space provided.

## P25. WHAT IS THE PERSONS MAIN OCCUPATION?

P25. What is this person's main occupation?
Question P25 applies to people aged 12 years and over.
Occupation here refers to the kind of work done by a person during the reference week. The occupation means the occupation which is regularly followed and to which the person devoted most of his/her working time. General or vague entries are not satisfactory. The best short description of a person's occupation is usually his/her job title or provide a brief description of the type of work they do. For those who do unpaid family work, ask about the type of activity they mainly do or are involved into in supporting their family.

## Instructions:

Enumerators should describe as fully as possible, the main job or the main task performed by the respondent during the reference period. In order to facilitate the work of the coders, and to obtain meaningful occupation statistics, enumerators should give a complete and accurate description of this main task. They should avoid general terms like mechanic, teacher, foreman, clerk etc. For instance for a respondent who is a clerk, it is important to know what kind of clerk he/she is: a filing, bank, pay or any other type of clerk. If the respondent is a teacher, it is important to state what kind of teacher he/she is: primary, secondary, tertiary, vocational etc.

Avoid making vague entries such as manager, labourer, inspector, clerk, repairman etc. You should take some care in your description to give some idea of the level of skill or responsibility involved in the job and what function is performed. Two or more words should be used to describe an occupation properly e.g. shop manager, farm labourer, dock labourer, accounts clerk, police inspector, health inspector, car repairman, telephone repairman etc.
Avoid "inflating" job descriptions. For example, "engineer" is an occupation which requires a level of education and skill beyond that of "mechanic" where the occupation can usually be learned by apprenticeship or on the job. Someone who does machinery repairs is more likely to be described as "mechanic" than an "Engineer".
Likewise, the enumerator should also provide the detail description about the type of activity the respondents mainly do or involved in as a worker in the agricultural sector.
In order to get a precise description of the occupation of respondents, it is often necessary for the enumerator to ask the respondent him/herself. Proxy respondents will sometimes be unable to give a precise description of the occupation of absent household members.
If during the reference period, the respondent was temporarily away from his/her job, due to leave, illness, labour dispute work etc. (inactive employed), his/her usual occupation should be entered. If a person is temporarily engaged as a supervisor or enumerator during a census, their usual occupation should also be recorded. If these supervisors/enumerators do not have a usual job, census supervisor/enumerator should be entered.
If a respondent did more than one job during the reference period, his/her main job should be recorded. It should be left to the respondent to determine what he/she considers as his/her main job.

## P26. DID THIS PERSON ACTIVELY LOOK FOR WORK?

Question P26 applies to people aged 12 years and over.
The purpose of this question is to capture those people who are available to work but could not find any work during the time of the census or in other words those who are classified as unemployed.
Instructions:

- This is again a simple yes/no question, options are:

1. $\square$ Yes Go to P28
2. $\square$ No Go to P27

- This question is a follow-up from P22. It should be asked of those people who do not have a job during the reference period but were actively looking for a job. If the answer is "Yes" mark box number 1 then skip to P28. If "No" mark the appropriate box, then proceed with the next question.

1. In order to be classified as unemployed, a respondent has to meet three criteria. These are that during the oneweek reference period, the respondent was:

- Without work
- Available for work
- Has been actively looking for work or in other words has taken steps to seek employment, or did not look for work because he/she believed no work was available, bad weather, had no transport, felt discouraged by previous rejections.


## P27. WHY DIDN'T THIS PERSON ACTIVELY LOOK FOR WORK?



Only 1 box should be marked and should be asked to people aged 12 years and over.
This question is asked to those people who are able to work but did not look for any work for some reason. Possible reasons for not looking for jobs have been coded from 1 to 10 as being shown in the questionnaire. Mark the appropriate box as indicated.

Question P27 has been designed to classify those who are not economically active (not in the labour force) according to a number of pre-coded categories.

Those respondents who did not work during the reference period and who did not actively look for work are not economically active. They need to be classified using the following pre-coded categories shown on the Census Questionnaire:

## Instructions:

The enumerators should mark one of the following pre-coded answers and specify other reasons for category 9:
1.Full time home maker
2. Full time student
3. Retired
4. Disabled
5. Didn't want to work (no intention)
6. Believes no work available
7. Bad weather
8. No transport
9..Discouraged by rejections
10. Other, specify

The following comments refer to the above categories of not economically not active persons:

## Full time homemakers

These can either be female or male. These persons are engaged in domestic duties like cooking, cleaning the house, looking after children etc. However, in the South Pacific Region, including Solomon Islands, many home workers, especially women, combine their domestic duties with other work, particularly growing food in their garden, fishing, collecting food from the sea etc. for subsistence (household consumption) etc.

Note: Domestic employees (house girls) should be classified as being in paid employment, even if their wages are far below the minimum urban wage.

## Full time students

This group comprises students born in 1997 or before who attend an educational institution at any level on a fulltime basis. In the Solomon Islands, a very large proportion of persons under the age of 20 fall into this category (for example school drop-outs).

## Retired persons

These respondents are retired from the public or private sector and are not involved anymore in any moneymaking activity. In many cases, these retired persons receive income (a pension) from a former job. In Solomon Islands, many retired persons are, however still involved in subsistence activities. They support their household by producing goods mainly for consumption of their own household.

## Disabled persons

These are respondents suffering from some form of permanent mental or physical disability. Because of this disability, they are unable to be engaged in any economic activity. From the point of view of labour force statistics, it is important that those who can be considered as disabled but are engaged in any economic activity are classified as wage earner, subsistence farmer or whatever the case may be. Note: In order to collect more information on disability in Solomon Islands, the interview schedule includes a separate section on disability.

## Believes no work available

These respondents have given up looking for work since they believe that work that is suitable for them is not available.

## Bad weather

These respondents are not actively looking for any work due to bad weather that makes it difficult for them to look for work.

## No transport

Transport is one of the factors that contributing to the reasons why people are not actively look for work during the time of the census. This is usually the case in remote places where transport is the main problem.

## Discouraged by rejections

These respondents are not actively looking for any work since they believed that they are been rejected to any work for some reasons such as gender issues, discrimination, cultural beliefs, etc

## Other

If a respondent cannot be classified into one of the above six categories, enumerators should specify this under 10: Other. In labour force statistics, this category "Other" is a very unsatisfactory rest category. It includes all persons who in spite of all the efforts of the enumerators cannot be classified under any of the above categories
(economically active and not economically active).

## P28. Was this person available for work?

- Note that after you ask this question, you will not ask F1-F6 if the person is a male, go to the Household questions.
- If this person is a female but less than 15 years of age, go to the Household questions.
- If this person is a female and has at least 15 years of age, then they must go to answer questions (F1-F6) the Women 15+ questions.


## QUESTIONS FOR WOMEN AGED 15 YEARS AND OVER

These questions are designed to measure fertility and also mortality rates. This information is essential for policy makers to make estimates of the size of future populations of the country and the types of government services they might need. Because of the sensitive nature of the questions they should be asked of the woman directly wherever possible.
Because some of these questions deal with death of a child, some respondents may find it difficult to discuss these matters. Be sympathetic and patient with women who find these questions to be sensitive.

- If this is the last person in the household, start asking questions for household and housing.

- Applies to all women aged 15 years and over who answered "Yes" to question F1.
- This question is to check the responses to the next two questions. The totals by sex in F3+ F4 $=$ the total in F2

- All live born children should be reported irrespective whether or not these children are still alive at the time of the census.
- Stillborn children should not be included where born children were born dead or did not show any sign of breathing at all. A child that cried after being born is considered as a live born child.

- This refers to all live births that are still alive and are either living in the household, live somewhere in Solomon Islands, or who are overseas. At this stage, when you have completed all information for person 1 then go back to question P1 to begin interviewing person 2. Follow the same steps until all members of the household have been interviewed. Then start with the Household and Housing.

\section*{THE HOUSEHOLD QUESTIONS}

The household and housing section of the interview schedule provides a comprehensive picture of building adequacy, living conditions, wealth and service provision. The Government departments requesting the information will make maximum use of this information in their policies and plans.

The household questionnaire applies to the household as a whole. The household questions are asked only once for each household and it is preferable to interview the head of the household. In cases where the head of the household is unavailable, then the spouse of the head of the household or the most senior member of the household can be interviewed. If there are more than 6 persons in the household, you need to fill the household section (questions H1-24) only once. Therefore leave the household section of the extra questionnaire(s) blank.

A household in this case is defined as "Those persons who usually eat together and share the work of preparing the food and/or the cost of work of providing it". Please refer to Section 4 : Census as Required by Law in this document.

In case that more than 3 household members died during the last 12 months, provide additional information on a separate sheet, and firmly attach it to this questionnaire.

It is very important to make sure that the persons who died were indeed former members of this particular household. The question does not refer to family members of members of this household who lived in other households.

On the other hand, new born babies (infants) that died shortly after birth in a hospital or dispensary (and therefore never lived in this household), but were born to mothers who are members of this household, should be recorded in this questionnaire.
A. If there were no deaths of household members during the last 12 months, mark X on box 2 (No), or mark X on box 3 (Don't know) if the respondent does not know whether there were any deaths during the last 12 months, and finish your interview.
B. If members of this household died during the reference period of 12 months, mark X on box 1 (Yes) in the top row.

For every person that died during the last month, establish the following information:

1. Mark the appropriate box for Sex (whether the deceased person was male or female);
2. Specify the Age of the deceased person; and
3. Note the Date of death in the boxes provided. If the exact date of death is not known, ask the respondent for the death certificate, or consult other household members.

If the deceased person was a female, ask whether the cause of death was related to pregnancy, and mark the appropriate box 1 (Yes) or box $2(\mathrm{No})$.

Pass the completed questionnaire to your Supervisor to check. He must also write his name and signature and the date he checked the questionnaires. On completion, all your work is to be handed in to the Area manager where a final quality check is undertaken.

## 15 . THANK THE RESPONDENT

When completing all the household questions, please go back again and check all questions in the questionnaire to make sure that they are all answered and correct. The interviewer should then fill up the box showing the total persons enumerated in this household. Enter the number of males, females and the total. Finally write your name clearly under column name corresponding to interview completed, put in your signature and date of completion.
It is very important to express your gratitude wholeheartedly to the respondent. This is a way of being polite and expresses your appreciation to the respondent for being able to stay throughout the interview.

## Refusals

A 'refusal' is where a householder declines to accept the interview or refuses to answer completely the questions on the Census questionnaire. In these cases, be courteous and offer to explain the reasons for the Census. Remember, the reason for someone refusing may be private or sensitive-for example, it could be that the person cannot read or write and is embarrassed to admit this.

If you suspect, however, that reluctance to take part is due to misunderstandings about the questions, suggest that the householder looks through the questionnaire before deciding.

You might also point out some of the benefits to the householder, particularly if you can relate the benefits to the person. Remember that your role as Enumerator is to gain the confidence of members of the public and to encourage their participation.

If you are still unsuccessful in converting the refusal, do the following;

- mark ' $R$ ' on the Census Questionnaire and also write this down in your notebook
- note the number of males and females in the Males/Females column (if known).

Let your Supervisor know as soon as possible and perhaps the Supervisor will visit the household again and discuss the matter with them again.

## 16 FINAL CHECK

Check the entries you have made to be sure they are complete and correct. There must be an entry on every line of the household part of the questionnaire. If you find mistakes or omissions, ask further questions and correct the record. It must be complete and accurate before you leave the household._Check that all your questionnaires are accounted for, and sort them into Household Number order, after finishing Enumeration each day. Doing this progressively will make your job at the end of collection easier. These tasks must be completed before your materials are returned to your Supervisor.

## 17 . DEBRIEFING

You may be asked to attend a debriefing session after Census. Any comments you make regarding the conduct of the Census operation will be appreciated. Your Area Manager will notify you of any such debriefing should this occur.

## THE RECORD BOOK AND NOTEPAD

1. The Record Book contains
a. A summary page
b. A village list
c. Children ever born listings
d. The historical calendar
e. Ships enumeration declarations
f. An Enumerator travel plan
and a list of dates of first and second visits on the back cover.
2. After completing the interview you must check that your Record Book has the Province, Ward and your Enumeration Area number and you must copy from Table D on your folder the total households and persons you have enumerated in the visit.
3. Village names and children ever born listings written in your Record Book are important and the Book should therefore be returned to the Supervisor with all other materials.
4. As you write your calculations and any notes on problems for the Supervisor on your notepad this will contain information for the Census Office and you should therefore also return the notepads. Don't forget to write the household number every time you make a note.

## COMPLETION OF ENUMERATION

1. When you are satisfied that you have completed the enumeration of every household in your area, make sure that the number of completed household questionnaires is the same as the number of households listed in Table D at the inside of your folder. Arrange your questionnaire sheets in order of household number, add the Record Book and place them back in your bag with all other census materials. Make sure Province, Ward and EA numbers are on your questionnaire sheets and then hand everything over to your Supervisor as soon as possible and not later than 7 December 2009.
2. The Supervisor will check your work carefully and he/she may ask you to go back to a household to put right something which you may have missed or not made clear. $\mathrm{He} /$ she will, when he/she is satisfied, inform you of payment of the balance of the monies due to you for your services as an Enumerator.

Write the Province name and number, the Ward name and number and EA number where you did your enumeration. Give for each folder the number of the first household that is in that folder.
2. If box B1 is filled in, box B2 must not be filled in.

## B2. Team approach

1. Only to be filled in for each folder if you received instructions to do so by the Census Staff.
2. In case all households in the folder are from one Ward only, you need only to fill in the first line (Ward A).

Write the Province number, the Ward number, the EA number (or EA numbers if your enumeration covered more than one Enumeration Area) and the number of the first household that is in that folder.
3. If the households of this folder are in two Wards, use the first two lines of this box (Ward A and Ward B). If they are distributed over three Wards use all three lines of box B2. Write the number of the first household in a new Ward in the last column of B2.

## C. File processing

1. Only the first two lines are of interest to you. Write the date and sign for the receipt of the folders at the time of the training course.
2. The supervisor should do the same after the folders are handed over to him at the end of the enumeration.

## D. Questionnaire folder No.

1. This box contains the number of the folder as provided by the Census Office.

## E. Household Summary

1. a. After you have completed the enumeration of the first household during the visits, copy the household number in column 1 of box $D$.
b. Copy the number of males and females from question H 2 of the first sheet of this household to columns 2 and 3 of the box D.
c. Add up the males and females and write the total on the same line in column 4 of box $D$.
2. Do the same for the second and all other households in this folder.
3. After the figures of the last household in the folder have been entered in box $D$, add up each of columns 1 to 4 and write their sums on the line called 'Folder total'.
4. When you have completed the enumeration of the second folder and have calculated the sums for that 'Folder total', write these totals also on the cover of your first folder on the line for ' 2 nd Folder total'. If you then also write the sums of the third and fourth folders in the columns 1 to 4 of box $D$ of the first folder you can add these totals to obtain your EA total at the bottom line of box D.
5. If you have trouble adding the figures in column 1 to 4 , try adding the figures of the first two lines and write the result on your notepad. Do the same for the second two lines etc. until all lines are added two by two. You now have only half the number of figures to add, but if this is still a problem you tackle these again two by two until you finally have the answer.
6. Columns 5 to 7 will be filled in like columns 2 to 4 , but the information will be taken from question H 2 after census night, i.e. when the information has been updated during the second visit.
7. You need not find a Folder total for column 7. You should just fill in the number of males and females of each household and write the sum for each household in column 7 on each line. Second, third and fourth Folder totals and EA totals also don't have to be calculated for column 7.
8. The Census Office will use columns 8,9 and 10.
9. Note that if the enumeration is done by a team in a supervisor area (Team Approach) the method of filling the box E remains the same, except that:

he/she is not present, ask the questions to any adult household member who can act as the Head of the household.
4. Now proceed with the individual questions. If the Head of the household slept in that household the night before the interview enter his/her name in row 1 of the individual questionnaire.
5. Complete the names, relationship, and sex of all persons, young and old, who were in the house on Sunday $9^{\text {th }}$ August 2009
6. Then find out the year of birth of all persons in the household and write them in (question P4). Every time you write in a person born in November 1997 or before or male ignore F1 to F6 Every time you write in a person born in 2005 or later, ignore P15 to P18 Every time you write a person born in 1998 or later, ignore questions P19
7. Next, you will fill in all the other questions for the Head of household, the same for the second person and then for each of the other person in the household.
8. Having completed the enumeration of every person in the household, you should inform them that you will be coming back during the week main enumeration in November
9. Do all this with black ball-point.
10. If you have enumerated every household in your Enumeration Area and that everything you have written is correct as far as you know. Correct any mistakes and sign and date each questionnaire. Take good care of all your census materials. Hand them all over to your Supervisor in good condition. Loose nothing.
11. Always be friendly, polite, tactful and patient. Always observe the confidentiality of the Census by reading and remembering the contents of your letter of appointment.
